MUST BEAR THE BURDEN ANYWAY

Weekly Sun: About the only argument advanced in opposition to the proposal to nationalize the second transcontinental railway is based on the statement that state ownership would involve an addition to the public burdens.

The statement is scarcely in accord with the facts. We must have railways in any case; they are essential to life under modern conditions; and we cannot have the conveniences thus afforded without paying for the same in some way.

In 1902, the earnings of all railways in Canada amounted to eighty-three and a half million dollars. Where did that money come from? Some of it was derived from American traffic; much the greater part of it came out of the pockets of the Canadian people.

State ownership of all these railways would not involve any addition to the charges imposed for their maintenance; it would simply mean that the revenue collected for that purpose, instead of being paid over to the representatives of private corporations, would be collected by officers of the government, representing the people.

WOMAN WITH 3 HUSBANDS
WANTS TO GO TO MERCER

No. 1 Declines to Enter Charge of Bigamy and Two Others Are in Jail.

Kingston, June 8.—(Special).—“Charles A. Wilds, committed for trial on the charge of stealing a horse and rig from Elijah Pennock, a livery-keeper at Stouffville.”

“Myrtle Wilson, committed for trial on a charge of vagrancy.”

The above are two items contained in the records of this morning's police court, and a strange story connects the two.

On Monday, Nov. 9, 1903, a couple drove in from Cataraqui, three miles from here, and were united in marriage by Rev. J. D. Boyd. Their names were Myrtle Wilson and Myrtle Wilson. The next morning Myrtle was torn from his bride of a few hours by officers of the law, on a warrant charging him with stealing cattle from Frontenac farmers a few days before. On Saturday, Nov. 14, his trial took place before Judge Price, and the sentence read, “Eighteen months in the Central Prison.”

Much sympathy was extended to the wife for a few days.

Then another incident in this woman's varied career was made public. Isaac Wheatley of Wolfe Island made the following statement:

“I, Isaac Wheatley, Methodist minister, residing on Wolfe Island, do hereby certify that on the 25th day of July, 1901, at the Methodist parsonage, Wolfe Island, Ont., I married, by the authority of license, David Wilson, aged 22, a bachelor, to Myrtle Elizabeth Clarke, aged 18, a spinster, both parties being residents of Wolfe Island, Ont., in the presence of John Clarke, Wolfe Island, and Lillie Hestman, Wolfe Island, who were the witnesses of the marriage.”

David Wilson, who is a respectable farmer, stated that he and his wife had lived together only a few days. He had left her because she had refused to leave her family and to come to a change of vagrancy and her appearance in court this week. She claims she was married to Wilds a few months ago, and that she drove down here from Stouffville in order to see her. She asked the magistrate to send her to the Mercer. She was sent up for trial by the magistrate.

It will be a strange ending if the wife, with three husbands, goes to the Mercer; husband No. 1 goes quietly on with his farm work on Wolfe Island, refusing to enter a charge of bigamy; husband No. 2 is serving his 18 months' sentence in the Central, and strong evidence is against husband No. 3. If convicted, will serve a term in the penitentiary.

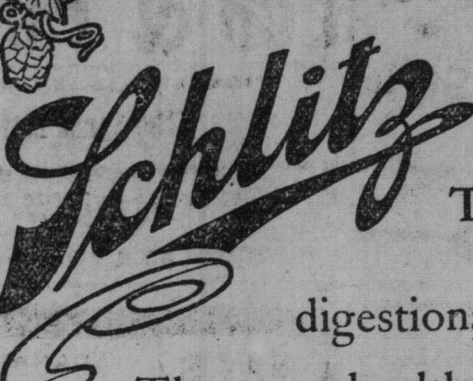

WITNESS TO YOUNG'S DEATH

Man Tries Up Who Saw Turfman Fire Fatal Shot.

New York, June 8.—Justice Clarke of the supreme court to-day denied the writ of habeas corpus for the release of Mrs. Nan Patterson, who is held in connection with the mysterious shooting of Caesar Young, the well-known book-maker and turf man. Mrs. Patterson was remanded to the Tombs Prison.

Nonetheless she is held as a witness under \$5000 bail, but District Attorney Jerome has intimated that in case of her release, either by bail or by any other means, she will be immediately re-arrested.

The case took a new turn to-day when Algonquin Meyer of New Canaan, Conn., publicly announced that he was a witness to the killing of Young, and stated that Young himself held the revolver which fired the fatal shot. His first story was told to the representative of a newspaper, but later the day's story went to the district attorney's office and said he desired to make a formal statement in regard to the case.

Jerome was not at his office at the time, but Meyer said he would return later in the day.

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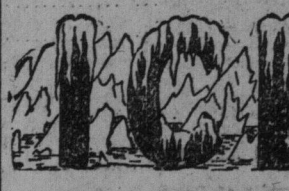

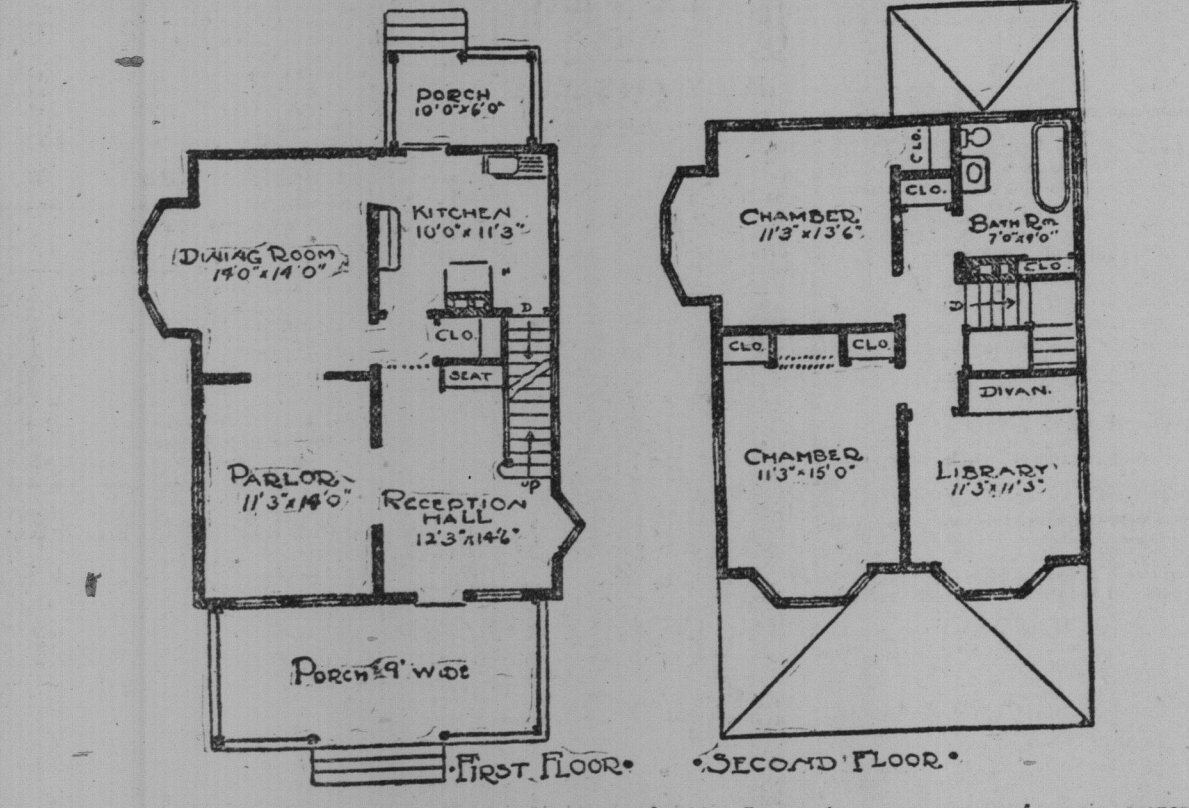
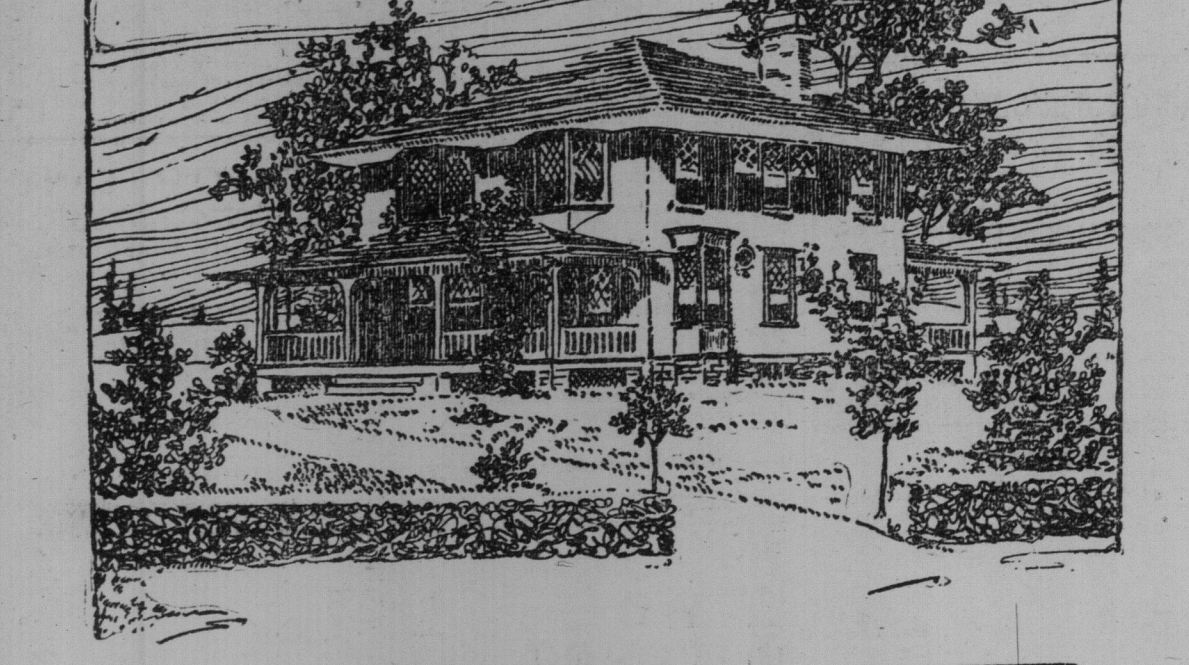

A BEAUTIFUL COTTAGE THAT CAN BE BUILT FOR \$2500



A beautiful cottage is shown here that can be built for \$2500. It contains seven rooms of ample proportions. There is a large porch from which you enter the reception hall, which is lighted by latticed windows. On the right is the parlor.

The parlor opens into the dining room which has a large bay window. This room is the largest one in the house. The kitchen is of good proportions and there is also a porch in the rear.
