Fog Signals.

Somebody put a fog signal—noisy, rather than dangerous—on the track yesterday, near Eva street, which, noisily exploding, according to its manner, frightened the horses drawing a carriage. Fortunately, no one was injured, as it was possible to turn down a side street; but someone might have been injured, as there were deep ditches close at hand.

We do not know who put the fog signal there. It certainly was not put there at the instance of organized labor, the influence of the responsible leaders of which throughout all the trouble has been on the side of law and order. Every sensible person should see that the majestic force of public opinion, as shown by the empty phantom cars, is a thousand times more powerful than any breaking of an occasional car window or setting off noisy fog signals could possibly be.

DECISION ON THE DUNKIN ACT.

Windsor, June 22.—Some time ago a bylaw was passed in the township of Colchester South repealing the Dunkin act. The temperance people claimed that the act, being a government measure, could only be repealed by the government, and Chief Justice Meredith was called upon to decide whether the bylaw passed by the township was constitutional. The judge has decided that no bylaw could be passed against the act, and has given his decision quashing the bylaw. This means that the township will be again under temperance law, although there are a number of hotels that have been licensed since the bylaw was passed. There is a question as to whether they can be closed before the expiration of the term for which the licenses are granted.

CASIMIR HAS THE KEY

To the Far-Famed Dreyfus Affair.

Important Matters Suppressed in Order to Prevent a Franco-German Conflict.

Boers and British Both Making Military Preparations.

The Khalifa on the Warpath—Beaten by "Friendlies" and Liable to Be Captured.

London, June 22.—The Vienna correspondent of the Daily Telegraph says: "The Austrian war office has learned that the evidence of Casimir Perier upon the Dreyfus trial will be startling. It will be shown that he holds the key to the affair which has hitherto been withheld in order to prevent a serious conflict between France and Germany. M. Casimir-Perier will depose that a German official of high social and military rank confidentially gave the French Government the information which led to the arrest of Dreyfus, but stipulated for silence as to the informant's name. Now M. Casimir-Perier will declare all."

THE TRANSVAAL WAR CLOUD.

The Daily Mail says this morning that the imperial government has practically decided upon a gradual reinforcement of the British troops in South Africa up to a total increase of 40,000 men.

A Cape Town telegram says: The activity in war office circles has been suspended in the matter of contracts for certain military requisites, on the ground that the regiments are now ready to leave Cape Town for Kimberley at short notice. An engine driver on the Cape Railway was seen to be armed and mounted, engaged in drilling at Hout-Kraal, near Deaar and Ponsfontein, not far from Kimberley. He was informed that they were Dutchmen preparing to assist the Boers in the event of hostilities.

DAVITT KICKS.

STOVE MOUNTERS' UNION.

AUSTRALIAN FEDERATION.

The referendum on the federation proposal will be taken in Victoria toward the end of next month. The London Times and other morning papers contain editorials in a congratulatory vein regarding the New South Wales referendum, which assures the success of Australian federation, independent of the results in Victoria and Queensland are a foregone conclusion. Mr. Chamberlain, in the House of Commons, announced amid cheers, that New South Wales had voted in favor of federation by a large majority.

AT THE HOUSE IN THE WOODS.

After a week's adjournment the arbitration committee met for a short time on Wednesday, Dr. Zorn, of the German delegation, and Frederick Hollis, of the United States delegation, attending. Mr. Hollis expressed himself as satisfied with the results of the trip he took to Berlin in company with Dr. Zorn, and the German delegates have been instructed to take part in the deliberations of the arbitration committee, which will now continue brisk work, pending the final decision in Germany. The disarmament committee, to which was submitted the circular of Count Muraviev, has considered the second, third and fourth paragraphs in sub-committee, the result being a negative vote upon all three, on the ground that it would be impossible to decide upon a satisfactory plan for checking the continued improvements in explosive ordnance. The first paragraph, which proposes to arrest the increase in land and sea forces and war budgets, has not yet been touched. The Russians, it is said, intend to introduce fresh proposals.

AN ADMIRAL LOSES HIS JOB.

On the instructions of the minister of marine, M. Lockroy, Vice-Admiral Cavellier de Caverville, chief of the naval staff, has transferred his command to Rear-Admiral Mallarmé. This measure is in consequence of a letter which De Caverville wrote to a member of the Chamber of Deputies, criticizing the alleged inadequacy of the national defense.

THE FRENCH CRISIS.

Paris, June 22.—Senator Waldeck-Rousseau was recalled to the Elysee Palace this morning, where President Loubet proposed that he form a cabinet immediately. It is hoped the senator will answer definitely during the course of the day.

ON THE WARPATH.

Advices received from the Congo State, state that the khalifa has recruited 30,000 men, and crossed the White Nile below Khartoum, capturing the Island of Abia, in that river. Cairo, Egypt, June 22.—It is announced that the khalifa has been defeated with heavy loss by the natives friendly to the British. It is added that he has fled to the woods with a few followers and that his capture is imminent.

CABLE NOTES.

At the Oxford assizes Joseph Stockley was sentenced to ten years' imprisonment for stealing a quantity of plate belonging to the Duke and Duchess of Marlborough.

The Princess Louise (Marchioness of Lorne) on Wednesday opened the great bazaar at Albert Hall in aid of the funds of the Charing Cross Hospital. The elite of the kingdom were present. The Venezuelan boundary commission reassembled Wednesday morning, and Sir Richard Webster, the British attorney-general, resumed his speech in behalf of the case of Great Britain. A dispatch to the Madrid Imparcial from Manila says Baron du Marais, a Frenchman who went to the rebel camp to intervene in behalf of the Spanish prisoners in the hands of the Filipinos, has been treacherously murdered. The first report of the murder of Baron du Marais was received in New York from Manila under date of May 11 and May 16.
