THE LANGWORTHYS

Revival of the Famous Case in Which Mr. Stead Figured Prominently.

London, Nov. 8 .- The famous Langworthy case, which caused a great sensation in England in 1887, has been revived by the death of Mrs. Langworthy, and the suicide of her husband in the Grand Hotel in Paris. The wife was the heroine of the extraordinary proceedings which William T. Stead, to whom she appealed, expoised in the Pall Mall Gazette. Her maiden name was Mildred Long, and she was a teacher in Paris, when she met Langworthy, a wealthy widower, who had inherited £150,000, and to whom the death of his mother and aunt meant immense heritages. His first wife was a sister of the Earl of Limerick. Langworthy met Miss Long in 1882, and married her secretly in a Catholic Church at Caen. He afterward went to South America, in his own stelam yacht, the Meteor. He constantly ill-treated his wife, and when he learned she was in a delicate condition of health, he separated from her at Buenos Ayres, declaring their marriage was a sham. Thereupon Mrs. Langworthy returned to her father, and began proceedings against her husband, who declared there had been no lawful marriage between them. London, Nov. 8 .- The Daily Chronicle says this morning: We have received information from a reliable quarter of a well-organized plot in Paris in the event of the inquiry before the court of cassation proving favorable to Dreyfus, to foment a riotous outburst in the French capital, to attempt to overthrow the civil power and to assassinate the leading champions of Dreyfus. THE CZAR'S BIG SCHEME. ported that the Russian Government is about to commence work on a great ship canal from the Baltic to the Black Sea. The estimated cost is \$155,-000,000, and the canal is to be com-pleted in five years. St. Petersburg, Nov. 8. - The St. Petersburg newspapers show great irritation at England over the settle-ment of the Fashoda affair, and agree in declaring that her conduct will arouse the powers interested in the Suez Canal to open discussions of the best means of preventing the final establishment of England in Egypt. The Nosti says that since the Egyptian question is purely of an international character, it must be solved by

THE KAISER'S NEW BATTLESHIP. Berlin, Nov. 8.—The trial trips of the new battleship Kaiser Frederich III. at Wilhelmshaven have been pronounced very satisfactory by the naval authorities. This war vessel is the first one completed of the series of five first-class ironclads which, in compliance with the new navy bill, are to be ready in 1902. Her maximum speed is eighteen knots.

It is announced that the Princess Henrich of Prussia will positively sail from Genoa on board the North Ger-man Lloyd steamer Prince Heinrich on Nov. 15. She will go direct to Kiautsau, where she hopes to celebrate Christmas with her husband. This report contradicts the rumor that she would relinquish the visit on account of the political complications in the far East.

WHAT HOOLEY KNOWS.

London, Nov. 7.-The examination of Ernest Terah Hooley, the company promoter, in bankruptcy proceedings, was resumed today. The court was crowded with people, including many ladies and a number of persons were unable to obtain admittance. During the day, Hooley made a number of curious statements, one being that he gave Lord Churchill £35,000 to induce the latter to sell an estate to a Mr. Ducnes. THE KHYBER PASS.

Simla, Nov. 8 .- The Indian Government have decided to take the Khyber Pass from under the control of the Afridis, owing to the rupture by the latter of their agreement, and will in future hold the pass itself. The allowances will be continued, and the government will maintain a militia recruited from the Afridis and other clans, but commanded by British offi-By the agreement of 1881 the right of the Afridis to the pass was acknowledged, and they received \$30,-000 in lieu of plunder from caravans and travelers. Now the tribe will receive this sum in lieu of the pass. The forts in the pass were formerly garri-soned by levies furnished by the Afridis, but paid by the British. of the pass will be a bitter pill for the tribe. A strong fort will be built at Lundi Kotal.
