A Limit to Estates.

London, Sept. 13.—The Times Wellington correspondent says that the Government land proposals, the most drastic in the history of the colonial legislation, are creating intense interest in New Zealand, especially the clauses compelling owners to sell within a decade the excess of land held beyond \$250,000 unimproved value, and the provisions preventing the present owners of 1,000 acres of first-class land or those of 5,000 acres of second-class land adding to their estates either by freeholds or leasehold. The correspondent adds that the proposals will be studiously combated.

WAR MANEUVERS OF GERMANS END

Emperor William Talks to Commanders for an Hour in Rainstorm.

Liegnitz, Prussia, Sept. 13.—The four days of theoretical war ended today with the defeat of the invading army (the Reds), commanded by Gen. Von Woyrich. There were 80,000 men engaged on a moist, sticky field. Rain fell all last night and today.

The most interesting person in this group probably was Gen. Von Moltke, the new chief of staff, who, it had been felt, by the army, was in some sense on trial, because if the maneuvers were not well managed he would have lost the confidence of the army.

Emperor said he was satisfied with the results, and with the quality of the troops, as shown in their endurance on march. A cavalry division did 46 miles in one day and a division of infantry 32 miles.

The Emperor hurried from the field by automobile to Camenz, 50 miles away, where Prince Albrecht of Prussia died this morning. The foreign observers remarked how little the Emperor showed fatigue, while most of them were rather haggard from getting up at 3 or 4 o'clock in the morning.

TWINS WITH TWIN WIVES

Life of Brothers Strange Parallel from Cradle to Manhood.

Kansas City, Sept. 14.—During the entire 32 years that Jiles M. Farris and Miles J. Farris have been on earth their lives have been parallel. To begin with, they were born twins, and one was named Jiles M. and the other Miles J.—just alike excepting for a transposition in the initial letters. They grew to manhood and both were married to twin sisters in their own home town—Louisiana, Mo. Jiles M. became a barber, but here is where Miles J. deviated, for he became a butcher—not such a great difference, either, as Jiles M. expressed it today.

But with neither, it seemed, domestic harmony at the fire-side prevailed, for Monday a petition for divorce was filed by Jiles M. against Martha A.
