"Since 1902 I have advocated a close union between the overseas dominions and the motherland," said Mr. Boal. "This would enable us to have a stronger army and navy, which I would supplement by training every young man between the ages of 18 and 29

"There should also be a change in our Imperial Government at London. The Dominion of Canada and the colonies have given their men freely in this war, and also in the South African war, and yet they have no voice in our imperial parliament.

Satirical Over Dr. Shaw's Statements Regarding Development of Power.

Chairman Philip Pocock took a fee ninutes this morning to reply to Con roller Shaw, and incidentally to in orm the public that Dr. Shaw's knowl dge of the working of the utilitie ommission is very slight,

"Dr. Shaw criticizes us about the nduits on Richmond and Dundas war, and yet they have no voice in our imperial parliament.

"As a tentative plan I would suggest that the number of members sent to parliament at London from the United Kingdom be reduced from 672 to 472, and that these 200 seats be given to representatives from the overseas dominions. Ireland would thus be reduced from 103 to 50 members; Scotland from 72 to 50 members, and England from 497 to 372 members.

"This plan would give Canada, Australia, New Zealand, South Africa and India a fair voice in our imperial questions such as trade and commerce and the army and navy. It is only right that the mother country should protect the overseas dominions in the real war, a trade war, that is to follow when this war is over.

"We must thank Dr. Shaw for giving us information as to the capacity of our power development at Springbank Park. We are developing 260 horse-power there from a 225 horsepower generator. We wanted to install two units there, but the hydro electric commission engineers did not think it feasible to do this, and we only have one. It has proved to be so good that we are considering the construction of another. In order to do so, we will have to heighten the dam at least two feet, and change the tailrace. This will cost \$10,000, but it would be good business. We have no 400 horsepower turbines there now. We have a waterwheel for pumping water, but it is merely a stancby to protect the water supply. It is used only when the power is off.

Didn't Give Franchise, "As for selling power to the Helena Power Company, it is much better for the city to get \$600 from the company than to hand it to the London Electric or a coal company. We made a good contract, and we had the right to make it. We did not give the Helena a franchise. The city council did.

"We never asked for the privilege of buying supplies for the city. The council came to us. We never offered.


