DAVIDSON REPORTS ON HORSE BUYING AND FOOD SUPPLIES

Cannot Find Any Wrong-Doing—Merely Pre-sumption.

[Special to The Advertiser.]

OTTAWA, March 23.—Two additional reports of the Davidson royal commission today, dealing with charges of improprieties in connection with Government food supplies, troops in the vicinity of Regina in the early part of the war, and with the purchase of horses for war purposes in the same vicinity.

In the report on the first matter the commission finds "That there was not at Regina any information found available, although it was sought for, to warrant the belief that contractors had not lived up to their specifications."

The evidence of Major H. W. Laird, O. C. Army Service Corps, in charge of sustenance at Camp Hughes in the vicinity of Regina, was not challenged. His was in effective performance of an onerous military duty.

The Horse Deals.

In connection with the investigation into charges of irregularities in the purchase of horses in Regina and vicinity, the commission observes that "there, as elsewhere, the regrettable presumption existed, that public officials were wrongdoers, rather than conscientious dischargers of their duties, and after reviewing the evidence, concludes:

"It is not possible to reach other conclusions than that the horses bought at Regina and its vicinities were honestly bought, of good quality and of reasonable price."

OVER TWENTY-FIVE PERSONS KILLED IN NEW ALBANY STORM

Injured May Total One Hundred—Buildings Are Demolished.

NEW ALBANY, March 23.—Between twenty-five and fifty persons were killed and probably one hundred or more were injured by a storm which late today swept over New Albany, demolishing scores of residences and several industrial plants. Twenty-five bodies are known to have been recovered, and it is expected this number will be materially increased when all the debris of wrecked buildings has been cleared away.

The lighting system for the residential section of the city was put out of commission by the storm, and the work of rescue is proceeding slowly, and with difficulty.

In addition to the bodies taken to undertaking establishments there were reports of others that were taken to private homes.

FRENCH LINER CARRIES 107 AMERICANS SAFELY

NEW YORK, March 23.—The French liner Rochambeau arrived at Bordeaux safely yesterday, according to a cablegram received here today from one of the passengers. The vessel left New York, March 12, with 631 passengers, of whom 107 were American citizens.

SINKING OF TANKER BY HUN SUBMARINE MOST DELIBERATE

Name Electrically Illuminated on Bow.

NINETEEN ARE DROWNED

No Efforts Made at All to Rescue Those in Peril.

THE HAGUE, March 23.—Detailed accounts of the sinking of the American oil tanker Healdton show that on Wednesday, about 8:15 p.m., notwithstanding the electrically illuminated words: "Healdton, New York," between the masts, the vessel was bombarded suddenly by an invisible submarine which first shot away the illuminated name and thereupon, without warning, twice torpedoed the vessel. Fire broke out at once. Owing to the nature of the cargo and an explosion in the machine-room the crew immediately sought safety in the boats, not having a minute to dress or collect any of their belongings.

All efforts to save the 19 men in the overturned boat were fruitless. The boat, with 13 men, including the captain, was sighted on Thursday by the steam trawler Java, which had just put to sea, but immediately returned to Ymuiden with the shipwrecked men. A number of these survivors were in their underclothing, and all were terribly exhausted by the ship's fatigue and exposure in the open boat to bitter cold and snow. They had not even enough strength to come alongside the trawler, whose skipper had to supply his best seamanship to approach the boat without running it down. Once on board the trawler some of the survivors fell to the deck in a faint from exhaustion.

According to the captain of the Healdton, one of the torpedoes hit his vessel in the stern, and the other amidships. Dutch fishermen say they observed the glow of the burning steamship in the distance, at first believing it to be the northern lights. In a dispatch from Ymuiden it is said that apparently the Healdton was within or on the border of the German danger zone, east of the free channel. Nothing could be distinguished of the nationality of the submarine, which fired without emerging fully, and disappeared immediately without paying any attention to the shipwrecked men. In addition to the illuminated signals, the Healdton's nationality was indicated by the fact that she was flying the American flag, and had her name painted on the side. The Dutch coast was reached by the four survivors of the ship recently torpedoed.

TENSION GROWS BETWEEN NORWAY AND GERMANY

Cologne Gazette Refers to Norwegian Insolence.

AMSTERDAM, March 23.—London.—Indications of renewed tension between Norway and Germany are appearing in the German newspapers. The Cologne Gazette makes a feature of an editorial headed, "Norwegian Insolence," in which it says:

"The press of Norway in these days has assumed a tone of an insulting character which Germany cannot tolerate. The Norwegians would do well to remember that their unbridled press campaign once before led to diplomatic tension, a sense of responsibility should have kept the papers from again singing the same tune."

Mr. Lindala was born in the province of Wassa, Finland, in 1880, and had lived in Canada over 30 years, and in Toronto 25 years.

FATHER MALONEY DEAD.

ST. JOHN, N. S., March 23.—Rev. Martin Maloney, C.S.B., died at 82. His rectory here today, aged 62 years. He was ordained in 1888 by Cardinal Gibbons. For a time Father Maloney was minister of St. John's.

HAMILTON, March 23.—When Mrs. Ida Carher, a pretty little woman, accompanied by two children, stepped into police court this morning and admitted pulling Penelope Scholes' hair because she stole the affections of her husband, Magistrate Jaffe imposed a fine of five cents, and then told Mrs. Carher's rival that he thought she got what was coming to her.

MORE U. S. PAPERS BANNED.

OTTAWA, March 23.—More American newspapers and publications are prohibited entry into Canada. They include America, a Russian newspaper in Philadelphia; the San Francisco Leader, Philadelphia; the Jewish weekly of New York; Germania, a German weekly in Canada; and "Why Germany Will Win the War," a pamphlet published in Detroit.

NEW C. P. R. SOLICITOR.

MONTREAL, March 23.—W. H. Curie has been appointed general solicitor of the C. P. R. and E. P. Flintoff assistant general solicitor, both with offices at Montreal. In 1914 Mr. Curie was appointed administrator of the Manitoba workmen's compensation act, which he resigned to accept his present position.

WINNIPEG, March 23.—The Manitoba Government has subscribed \$100,000 for the war loan out of the telephone re-employment reserve.

FLEET OF FIFTEEN DUTCH SHIPS NOW ON WAY TO STATES

Forced to Brave Subs Because of Food Necessity.

NEW YORK, March 23.—An Associated Press dispatch from Washington tonight, says: "A fleet of fifteen Dutch steamships was said here today to have sailed recently from a port in Holland for the United States by way of Halifax. The vessels all steamed out the same day, and now are believed to be well north of the German submarine zone around the British Isles. It is intended by the Netherlands Government, which has the ships under charter, to have them return by the same route they came. It was sailing here today that the lack of foodstuffs in Holland made it necessary that a large quantity be obtained at once, and it was felt that a merchant fleet could best be used to the dangers of the seas than individual ships. Many Dutch ships loaded with grain are now being detained in British ports either by the British authorities or through fear of German submarines."
