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REVOLUTIONARY RIOTING AT THE RUSSIAN CAPITAL

CLARK CABINET, POSSIBLY ROWELL, OTTAWA RUMORS

Former May Enter Conservative Ministry Without Portfolio After a Reorganization—His Oratorical Powers To Be Used.

Ottawa, July 18.—Ottawa places no credence upon the rumor that Dr. Michael Clark is at once to join the Borden cabinet. He is an eventual possibility without portfolio, but will not enter the ministry until there is a general reorganization, and that in turn will likely await judgment of the commission which has been sitting upon Hon. Robert Rogers' case.

There is renewed talk of securing N. W. Rowell. One rumor says that Dr. Clark will be used as one of the chief campaign speakers by the Government and will afterwards be given a seat in the senate.

KILTIES GATHER IN MANY FINE RECRUITS AT NEW YORK CITY

Bagpipes and Tartans Prove Irresistible As Enlisters.

NEWARK'S BIG WELCOME

Canadian Highlanders Cheered by Thousands in New Jersey City.

London, July 18.—It was said here today that the results of British recruiting in the United States had been very satisfactory, and that the quality of the recruits was high.

New York, July 18.—The Canadian Highlanders, who are spending this week here in the interests of the British recruiting week, took charge of a number of recruiting stations in Madison Square, Union Square and City Hall Park today to stimulate recruiting for the British and Canadian armies. Recruiting officers for the United States army said that the kilties have done much to aid recruiting for the American forces during the few days they have been in the city.

Concerts on Buses. While some of the Highlanders were urging British subjects to enlist at the various recruiting stations, the members of the famous band and the pipers rode to different parts of the city on motor buses, giving impromptu concerts en route. Tonight the Highlanders will take part in a special concert on the last battleship recruit in Union Square, when a hundred U. S. army "rockets" will be given a send-off before leaving the city.

Cheered by Thousands. For a few hours the kilties visited Newark, and cheering thousands surrounded them everywhere they went. They were met by a band of march down Broad street in the early afternoon, and almost stopped the progress of the Highlanders and the 300 New Jersey Guardsmen who were their escorts. The police were swamped in the rush and only when a score of military police and mounted men took the situation in hand was a way forced through the crowds for the troops to proceed to the place of official welcome by Mayor Raymond in front of the gayly decorated city hall.

Guests of Newark. Following recruiting stations in the afternoon in the parks, the men of the Highlanders' contingent dined as guests of the city, while their officers and Brigadier General White were entertained at the Essex Club.

At 6 o'clock the two Canadian companies returned to New York, their smiles being one of the outstanding features of the day. The lines of members of the Newark Scottish Societies, in uniform and in civilian dress, lined the streets, and the visitors marched with bagpipes playing to the Park Place station, where they were met by a large number of recruits, for recruits enrolled at the tents in the parks in large numbers.

PRENCH NON-COMBATANTS SENT HOME BY GERMANS

London, July 18.—French men, women and children, under eighteen and more than fifty years of age, are being returned by the Germans to France from the occupied sector in the northern part of the country, at the rate of 1,000 a day, according to advices received by the British government here. The repatriation is being carried out through Switzerland.

Thousands of these refugees have arrived at Evian-les-Bains, in the department of Haute-Savoie, on Lake Geneva. Their condition is described as most pitiful. The relief commission and the American Red Cross may take measures to relieve them, but as the refugees have no adequate accommodations for such numbers, it is daily becoming more congested.

A TOTAL WRECK.

Ymuiden, Holland, Tuesday, July 17. The German merchantman, Magdalena, Blumenthal, which was captured off Zandvoort while attempting to run the British blockade from Rotterdam to Germany, is a total wreck. The crew, one of whose members was wounded, has been landed. The Blumenthal was one of the seventeen German merchantmen which put out from Rotterdam, most of which were either stranded or sunk or captured by British destroyers.

AIR DOMINANCE WILL BE NEEDED TO WIN THE WAR

U. S. Officers Realize Necessity of Overwhelming Air Fleet.

Paris, July 18.—American army officers here have become more and more impressed with the necessity for complete domination of the air to win the war. "Heretofore the forces on each side have been about equal. One side or the other has been successful by concentration of forces in certain places, and continued successful until the attacked side over-concentrated. The Germans did the first big concentration at Verdun, but he Allies won there by 'out flanking' them, said an American officer today. "If we had absolute ascendancy in the air we could destroy Zeppelins and make the submarines harmless. "It is difficult for folks at home to understand, maybe, when a machine ascends near hostile lines today it does not come home unless it is of the latest type and unless its pilot is highly trained not only in scientific flying but in shooting. Aeroplanes today not only carry machine guns, but cannon."

Reichstag Summoned To Hear Chancellor's Message Thursday

"Communication From the Government," Michaelis Calls It.

London, July 18.—A dispatch to the Exchange Telegraph Company from Berlin, via Amsterdam, announces that Chancellor Michaelis has asked the president of the Reichstag to summon Thursday afternoon's session for "a communication from the Government."

RUSSIANS WIN FIGHT TO HOLD HILLS IN GALICIAN CAMPAIGN

Driven From Heights, They Recaptured Point by Dashing Counter-Attack.

Petrograd, July 18.—Heavy fighting is continuing in the region of Novica and Novica, but as the result of a valiant counter-attack by our infantry and cavalry the enemy was thrown back and we recaptured the above-mentioned heights. "There has been no material change in the situation on the Rumanian and Caucasian fronts."

Gen. Korniloff's armies in Eastern Galicia have been held up for a time by the hurrying of heavy contingents of German reserves to the front, stiffening up the Austrian defence along the River Lomnica.

The holding of this river line is vital to the safety of the Teutonic position not only in this part of the front, but northward to the Galician border, and that is why the German reinforcements have been so numerous.

Active in West. Meanwhile there is notable activity along the Franco-Belgian front. The French at Verdun have just completed an important operation in the rearmament of their front north-west of Verdun, which was disturbed by German attacks in the vicinity of Hill 304 late last month.

The French, in fact, carried their successful counter-attack even beyond the original line, and drove nearly two-thirds of a mile into the German front from Avocourt Wood to west of Hill 304.

The new ground is being firmly held, several counter-thrusts undertaken by the crown prince's troops last night being completely repulsed.

On the British front there is pronounced aerial activity and there has been a notable amount of heavy work done by the artillery, particularly along the lines in Belgium.

GERMANS FAINT HEARTED, SAYS RETIRING MINISTER; TELLS THEM TO 'BUCK UP'

Amsterdam, July 18.—Many Germans have become faint-hearted, says Gen. von Stein, Prussian minister, as quoted by the General Anzeiger of Dusseldorf. The general, replying to a telegram from the German National Union, expressing confidence in him, gave the following advice: "Everyone should possess confidence in the future greatness of Germany, but an excessive anxiety and faint-heartedness is still troubling many persons. Everyone should endeavor to give an example of self-renewal and sacrifice, and to make selfishness and cowardice ashamed of themselves."

Admiral von Tirpitz, replying to a similar telegram, said: "The U-boat is extremely effective, but needs time."

GERMAN HEADQUARTER-STATION DUG-OUTS OF THE HINDENBURG LINE



The German headquarters underground station, the entrance to which is photographed here, was stormed by the British. It shows better than any description the elaborate fortifications at some of the German positions. The place resembles a permanent work in a regular fortress, rather than an entrenchment in a line of field defenses.

ARMED SOLDIERS AND SAILORS JOIN WORKERS AND WOMEN IN RIOTING AT RUSSIAN CAPITAL

Grave Demonstrations Against the Government Continue in the Streets of Petrograd—Many Wounded by Indiscriminate Shooting—Garisons Are Reported Ready To Revolt.

Petrograd, July 18.—Another manifestation of armed sailors and soldiers, and workmen and women, in which shots were fired, took place along the Nevsky Prospect yesterday. The extent of the casualties is unknown. "Yesterday's disturbances were a repetition of those of the day before, except that they occurred at 10 o'clock in the afternoon, whereas the first outbreak occurred around midnight. "The death of the Nevsky Prospect. A number of stray shots were heard, followed by the firing of rifles against upper windows and roof tops at a seemingly imaginary foe. "The shooting ceased. Everybody then emerged from their shelters, and the soldiers, after a brief excited discussion in small groups, swung their rifles over their shoulders and returned to the barracks. "After Kerensky. Twenty minutes after the cessation of shooting the Nevsky Prospect was normal. A dozen victims were taken to the Anglo-Russian Hospital, while automobiles filled with soldiers, sailors and civil Maximilians with rifles rushed about the city. Six of these cars dashed into the Warsaw station for the purpose of preventing the departure of Minister of War Kerensky for the front, but it was found he had left a quarter of an hour previously. Some private automobiles were seized and machine guns mounted thereon. A number of demonstrators displayed banners, demanding all the power for the Workers' and Soldiers' Council.

Garrisons Against Government. The villa of Mademoiselle Kheskinska, dancer and actress, who was the mistress of Nicholas, was converted into the headquarters of the 1st Machine Gun Regiment, which was one of the prime instigators of the trouble. Wagon after wagon with Maximilians arrived there. Part of the Grenadiers from regiments at Moscow and Pavlovsk were among the anti-government demonstrators. It is stated that garrisons from Oranienbaum, nineteen miles from Petrograd, and from Pulkovo, are awaiting instructions from the Workers' and Soldiers' Council at Petrograd. Leaders of the corps in France, is in charge of the department. Recruits will be sent immediately to training stations in Canada.

appeal to all workmen and soldiers of Petrograd. The appeal says: "Certain persons who are unknown to you, contrary to the unanimous general will, not excepting that of the Socialist parties, to appear on the streets with weapons and invite you to protest in this fashion against the disbandment of regiments which have dishonored themselves at the front by criminal breach of their duty towards the revolution. "We, the delegates of the revolutionary democracy of all Russia, declare that the disbandment of the regiments by the military committee and by order of Minister of War Kerensky, whom you elected. Consequently, every act in an act against your brothers shedding their blood at the front. We remind you that no military unit should appear with arms without special authority of the commander-in-chief, who is in agreement with us. "Whoever infringes this order we regard as traitors and enemies of the revolution. We are taking all measures in our power to see that this order is carried out. "Simultaneously the provisional government posted a proclamation, reading: 'In view of armed demonstrations of certain military units July 18 and 19, the nights of the 16th and 17th, which resulted in several people being wounded, all demonstrations are prohibited.'"

10,000 SOLDIERS IN CANADIAN HOSPITALS

Number of Invalids Shows a Falling Off by Latest Statistics.

Ottawa, July 18.—The number of men under the care of the military hospitals commission fell from 7,618 to 7,478 between June 30 and July 8, though arrivals since that date may be found to have neutralized the reduction.

The latest total, 7,478 includes 6,090 convalescents, with 928 in sanatoria for tuberculosis and 460 in other institutions.

The number of Canadian soldiers invalided in England reached its maximum, 22,562 on May 25. The following week showed a decrease of 80; this was made up this: In Canadian hospitals, 10,226; in sanatoria for tuberculosis, 74; in British, that is, non-Canadian, hospitals, 9,710. Of the total, 10,363 were sick and 3,657 were wounded. There were 709 officers among the invalids.

BRITISH RECRUITING FOR AIR SERVICE IN STATES

Boston, Mass., July 15.—Men between the ages of 18 and 25 years who have a college education or its equivalent are being sought by a new department of the British Recruiting Mission here, opened yesterday for the purpose of enlisting men for the Royal Flying Corps. Lieut. Allan N. Thomas, a Canadian, who has served with the corps in France, is in charge of the department. Recruits will be sent immediately to training stations in Canada.

COAL, COKE, FOOD; BRITISH PRIZE IN NORTH SEA COUP

Heavy Blow Struck At Germans Through Capture and Sinking of Merchant Flotilla—British Deny Charge of Attacking In Dutch Waters.

London, July 18.—Telegrams from an unnamed east coast port, to where the German ships were brought after being captured by British destroyers in the North Sea, say they are all trim, serviceable craft, manned by from a dozen to eighteen men. They contain valuable cargoes of coal, coke and provisions.

An unconfirmed report says one of the vessels is the Great Eastern Railway steamer Brussels, whose captain, Fryatt, was executed by the Germans after his capture in June of last year.

A dispatch from Amsterdam says steamers are constantly plying between Rotterdam and Hamburg, carrying provisions and German coal. The latter is sent by the Rhine to Rotterdam, whence it is shipped to Hamburg in order to relieve congestion on German railways.

NOT IN DUTCH WATERS. London, July 18.—The allegation of Dutch newspapers that part of Monday's encounter between British destroyers and German merchantmen, which were attempting to run the blockade from Rotterdam, occurred in Dutch territorial waters is generally discredited in naval circles here. The only reports thus far received at the admiralty come from commanders of British forces in the action, in the form of wireless summaries, the substance of which was covered in yesterday's official statement. The complete reports, when received, are expected to clear up the situation satisfactorily.

It is explained that the shoals along the Dutch coast in this district extend so far to sea that it is necessary for ships to steer a course well outside the territorial limits. The attack is said to have occurred at a point more than four miles from shore.

A Quick Hard Blow. It will be a source of great satisfaction in all the Allied countries if Monday's coup succeeds in putting a halt to the traffic between the Rhine and Hamburg, which has been increasing in recent weeks, with greater boldness on the part of the German captain, who British withheld their attack until the latest flotilla thus far sent by this country was well on its way, and then dealt a quick, hard blow.

Already it has been announced from Rotterdam that German steamers have been ordered to stop at sea, and to lay up 20 coal steamers there instead of at Rotterdam, to run them home through the sea lane.

THE OFFICIAL ACCOUNT. London, July 17.—(Delayed.)—Reporting officially the capture near the Dutch coast of a number of German steamships, the British admiralty statement says: "Some of our light forces whilst patrolling the North Sea on Monday night sighted a number of German steamers ahead. The signal to stop and abandon the ship was hoisted, and shots were fired across their bows to emphasize the order. "Made For Shore. "The enemy ships, however, and all the enemy ships made for the Dutch shore. Two of the rear-most ships reached shore, having been damaged badly by our gunfire. The other two ships were, however, intercepted and captured by our destroyers, who placed prize crews aboard and brought them away under their own steam. The crews of these ships the crews abandoned their ships. The other two crews were brought to shore by our gunners. All four ships are now in harbor in this country. Their names are Pollworm, Brizelitz, Marie Horn and Heinz Blumhagen."

SIX YOUTHS DROWNED BY UPSETTING OF CANOE

Quebec, July 18.—News comes from Notre-Dame-de-Lac, Quebec, that six youths drowned on Monday evening last. All the youths were from the same family, and were in a canoe when it upset. The names of the victims are: Joseph, Jean, Robert, Raymond, and two sons of Mr. P. Tinet. The tragedy was the result of the upsetting of a canvas canoe.

BLOW UP WIRELESS TOWER. Riverhead, N. Y. July 18.—Destruction of a wireless tower, erected here several years ago by Nikola Tesla, inventor, for experimental purposes, has been completed by Government order to prevent its being used by German spies to transmit information, and the tower was blown over. It was about 100 feet in height, and was abandoned some time ago by Tesla.
