HYDRO WILL NOT SPEND MUCH OF MONEY IN LONDON LONDON DOCTOR SUES C. P. R. FOR \$2,000 DAMAGES

Few Minor Additions to the Transmission System.

Only a comparatively small amount of the \$17,000,000 appropriation for hydro will be expended in the Niagara district. All that London is likely to see as a result of the expenditure is a few minor additions to its transmission system. A sum of \$1,250,000 has been appropriated for use in the Niagara district.

A million dollars is a comparatively small amount to the hydro system, and the end is not in sight. Transmission of the power which will be available when the Chippewa development is completed will cost \$45,000,000. Of this amount, \$15,000,000 will be expended by the hydro system on transmission lines. The remaining \$30,000,000 will be indirectly contributed by the purchasers of the power when they buy motors and other appliances.
