TO LET O'CALLAGHAN **RESHIP AS SEAMAN**

Labor Department Recognizes State Department Jurisdiction.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 19 .- Jurisdiction of the state department in cases of aliens arriving in the United States without a passport is recognized by the department of labor, in a formal statement sent today by Secretary Wilson to the chief of the immigration bureau. It was announced, however, that the decision of Secretary Wilson that Donal O'Callaghan, lord mayor of Cork, should be allowed to reship on a foreign vessel by reason of the ruling that he occupied the status of "seaman" had not been rescinded.

The labor secretary's letter to the in migration bureau said that the decision that O'Callaghan be permitted to reship should be "consummated at the earliest possible moment." Earlier in the day it had been announced that the labor secretary had written to O'Callaghan's counsel, directing that the lord mayor be surrendered "promptly" to the immigration inspector at Norfolk. immigration inspector at Norfolk.

O'Callaghan was paroled in the custody of his counsel, Judge Lawless, of Norfolk, soon after he arrived at Norfolk from Cork as a stowaway and without a passport. He is now in New York, but whether he will appeal to the courts has not yet been announced.

The announcement of Secretary Wilson as to the jurisdiction of the state department in all cases similar to those of the lord mayor is understood to be in the nature of a general agreement between the two departments, through which it is hoped to avoid in the future controversies similar to the one which controversies similar to the one which arose in his case, owing to the failure of Secretary Wilson to honor the order of Acting Secretary Davis that O'Callaghan be deported immediately.
