Their scheme, of course, had the double purpose of crippling the lumber industry of Ontario and raising prices

on the United States consumer. The Herald points out that " anticipating retaliation, these Michigan lumbermen so framed the lumber clauses in the Dingley Act as to make it next to impossible for the Canadian parliament to enact retaliatory legislation." The United States Tariff Act of 1897 contained a clause dictated by them which provided "that if any country or dependency shall impose an export duty upon sawlogs.round unmanu-
