WHITE SLAVE TRAFFIC POLICE BEGIN CRUSADE

Three Arrests Made — Archie Cochrane Very Ill — Motor Boat Race Results.

HAMILTON, Aug. 15.—(Special.)—In connection with the crusade against the white slave traffic among foreigners, the police Saturday afternoon raided 198 Princess-street and arrested Ralph Rufus as the keeper, and Annie Merry and Rose Bartlett, two young women who claim Toronto as their home, as inmates. The merry girl had to be taken to the city hospital.

The police think they have rounded up a gang that has stolen about fifty bicycles during the past month. One youth was placed under arrest and he has "squaled" and the police are trying to locate the wheels.

Archie Cochrane, county treasurer, was taken to the city hospital this afternoon to undergo an operation. His illness came upon him very suddenly, and his condition is serious.

REFUSE TO OBEY DIAZ. Martial Law May Be Proclaimed in Two Mexican States.

MEXICO CITY, Aug. 15.—President Diaz has conferred upon Gen. Gerónimo Trevino, commander of the Third Military Zone, with headquarters at Monterey, absolute authority to deal with the political situation in the States of Coahuila and Nuevo Leon.

Unless the legislatures of the respective states follow President Diaz's instructions in filling the vacancies caused by the removal of Gov. Miguel Cardenas of Coahuila and Gov. Bernardo Reyes of Nuevo Leon from office, a military regime will be established by Gen. Trevino over the two states.

The Legislature of Coahuila is still unanimously opposed to electing Pedrillo Pena to the governorship. Pena's name was submitted by Gen. Trevino, but the legislature has ever refused to accept the resignation of Gov. Cardenas which was demanded by President Diaz.

The city of Saltillo is filling with troops preparatory to establishing a military rule over state affairs. The anomalous condition exists of Cardenas still performing the functions of governor notwithstanding that he was removed from office several days ago by President Diaz.

The legislature claims full right under the constitution to deal with the situation. It is the first time in the history of Mexico that a state legislature has refused to obey the orders of the chief executive authority. It is stated here that Gen. Trevino will get the political affairs of Coahuila well in hand before turning his attention to Nuevo Leon. Many reports are current of possible revolutionary uprisings in various parts of northern Mexico, but they are found to come from irresponsible sources.

CONVALESCENT NABBED. Assault and Robbery Charged Against Oliver Brown.

Upon his release Saturday from St. Michael's Hospital, where he had been ill for a few days, Oliver Brown, 197 Simcoe-street, was arrested by Detective Montgomery, charged with assault and robbery. Miss Campbell, who runs a grocery store at the corner of University and Agnes-streets, is the complainant. The woman complained to the police a week ago that two men entered her store and while one held her, the other rifled the till of \$7. Brown has been identified as having on that day been seen leaving the store.

EXERTION KILLS WOMAN. Mrs. Anna N. Bryce Drops Dead While Scrubbing Floor.

After a two months' vacation in Cleveland, Ohio, Mrs. Anna N. Bryce, dropped dead of apoplexy Saturday evening while scrubbing the floor of the kitchen of her residence, 117 Coan-avenue.

Coroner Orr was called, but decided an inquest was not necessary as death was obviously due to an attack of the heart brought on by exertion. Deceased was middle aged. She returned from Cleveland Saturday morning. Her son was killed two years ago by a train at the Dunn-avenue crossing.

REV. R. HARRIS LLOYD HERE London Preacher Who is Doing Splendid Mission Work.

Rev. R. Harris Lloyd of the Southwest London Mission, London, England, preached at Parkdale Methodist Church last evening. Rev. Mr. Lloyd is associated in missionary enterprise with Rev. Mrs. Guy Pearce, who is well-known in Toronto.

He spoke of the needs of the mission in London, and stated that \$25,000 was urgently required to erect a building and equip it for industrial instruction. They work among 250,000, who are without any church associations whatever. His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales is in hearty accord with the aims of the mission and has donated sums of money to enable the missionaries to extend the work.

Rev. Mark Guy Pearce had addressed a letter to Canadians, commending Rev. Mr. Lloyd, in which he says: "His noble work among the denizens of southwest London has given him a prominent place in the ranks of our younger and most aggressive ministers."

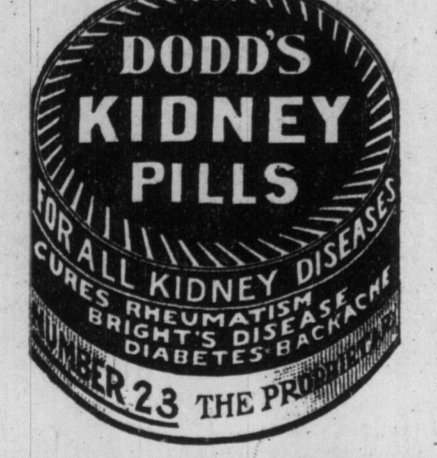

REV. R. HARRIS LLOYD HERE London Preacher Who is Doing Splendid Mission Work. Rev. R. Harris Lloyd of the Southwest London Mission, London, England, preached at Parkdale Methodist Church last evening. Rev. Mr. Lloyd is associated in missionary enterprise with Rev. Mrs. Guy Pearce, who is well-known in Toronto. He spoke of the needs of the mission in London, and stated that \$25,000 was urgently required to erect a building and equip it for industrial instruction. They work among 250,000, who are without any church associations whatever. His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales is in hearty accord with the aims of the mission and has donated sums of money to enable the missionaries to extend the work. Rev. Mark Guy Pearce had addressed a letter to Canadians, commending Rev. Mr. Lloyd, in which he says: "His noble work among the denizens of southwest London has given him a prominent place in the ranks of our younger and most aggressive ministers."
