PLEAS FOR THOSE WHO "LORD RAIN"

Opposition at Ottawa Condemns Delays in Appointing B. C. Governor and Judges.

OTTAWA, Nov. 26.—(Special.)—The first real scrap of the season took place today over the delay in the appointment of the lieutenant-governor of British Columbia, and the judges of the court of appeal of that province until the result of the election was known.

Standard Weight of Bread.

Major Currie introduced a bill to amend the Inspection and Sale Act by fixing the weight of loaves of bread by federal enactment. He said that the Dominion government has jurisdiction as to weights and measures and that parliament has fixed the weights of certain articles, including bread.

Inland Revenue Bill.

Hon. Wm. Green's bill to amend the inland revenue act was considered in committee. It provides for an increase in the rate of inland revenue from 20 to 25, and makes provision for the doing up of cigars in packages of 25 as well as of 10.

TO EXHUME THREE BODIES

OXBRIDGE, Ont., Nov. 26.—(Special.)—Since the departure of Archibald McLachlan from town last evening, the excitement of the inquest and trial is gradually dying away. The World reporter learned today on good authority that the bodies of the deceased woman and boys will be exhumed, and a further analysis made of various organs of the bodies, this being necessary owing to the fact that Dr. W. C. Sproule, who had charge of the post-mortem, had left the stomachic establishment from Saturday afternoon until Sunday afternoon before it was properly sealed and handed over to the authorities.

NEW DEPARTMENTAL BUILDING

OTTAWA, Nov. 26.—(Special.)—The minister of public works informed the house today that the new departmental building, which is proposed to be constructed in Ottawa, will cost \$2,429,990, including the heating and interior fittings. The site cost \$228,000. The new buildings will be large enough to accommodate all the departments which occupy rented buildings, and on which the government now pays an annual rental of \$140,000.

DECLARED TO STOCKHOLDERS OF NOVA SCOTIA S. & C. CO.

MONTREAL, Nov. 26.—(Special.)—At a meeting of the directors of the Nova Scotia Steel and Coal Company today, a discussion of financial position showed that \$3,500,000 of new 5 per cent. bonds and \$1,000,000 of new debenture stock had been disposed of in Canada, and that the net price realized was over 84 per cent. of par. The output of the steel mill for the past year aggregated over 800,000 tons, all disposed of, and nearly one-half of which was sold in the St. Lawrence market.

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COOK SUFFERS A BREAKDOWN

Arctic Explorer in Very Nervous State—Sends Records Away Secretly to Avoid Theft.

NEW YORK, Nov. 26.—The Herald says: As a result of the mental strain under which he has labored, Professor Cook's records for the Danish expedition, Dr. Frederick A. Cook, discoverer of the north pole, has suffered a nervous breakdown. He is at the hotel of an intimate friend in New York, but his condition is such that not even his closest personal friends are allowed to see him.

TORE UP THE SIDEWALK ARRESTED FOR THEFT

MAY CALL STRIKE OFF


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TAX ON FOREIGN CORN.
