BEHIND WITH THE FEES

Toronto, July 8.—The names of 189 physicians have been stricken off the register of physicians by the Ontario Medical Council, which is in session this week at its building on University avenue.

These 189 physicians are three or more years behind with payments of the annual fee of \$2. They decline on principle to pay the fee, holding that once they become fully qualified physicians they should not be compelled to part with an annual fee. It is stated that those whose names have been stricken off cannot legally collect fees for practice, nor give expert testimony in a court of law while their names are off the register. It is said that the registrar is acting according to Government legislation in striking off the names.

At this morning's session of the council a committee was promised to consider and report on the advisability of securing reciprocity between the College of Physicians and Surgeons of Ontario and the general medical council of Great Britain and provided for in the medical act of 1907.

BOSTON HARBOR IS FIRE SWEEP

Quarter of a Mile Wiped Out at a Loss of Millions.

BRITISH SHIPS WERE BURNED

Three Warehouses, Four Piers, Loaded Cars and 30,000 Bushels of Grain Gone.

Boston, July 8.—Fanned by a brisk north wind, a fire believed to have been caused by spontaneous combustion, or a locomotive spark, swept nearly a quarter of a mile of the harbor front of East Boston today, causing a property loss estimated at nearly \$1,500,000. Much of the loss falls upon the Boston and Albany Railroad. Two persons were reported missing, and it is thought that many perished in the flames. They are:

Daniel Sullivan, a watchman at the Cunard line pier.

Miss Sadie Arnold, a clerk employed by the Cunard line.

Today's fire was the most destructive that has occurred along the harbor front in many years. The flames spread with remarkable rapidity, and by the time the first fire fighting apparatus arrived the fire was beyond control and leaping from pier to pier.

Great Destruction.

Within half an hour after the first burst of flames was discovered four piers, three warehouses, a grain elevator containing 30,000 bushels of grain, and many loaded freight cars had been destroyed.

Several vessels and lighters narrowly escaped destruction. The big Leyland line steamer Devonian was moored at one of the piers which was destroyed, but the craft was warped out into the stream without sustaining any damage. Less fortunate were the British bark Belmont, of Yarmouth, N. S., The Belmont was moored by the pier where the fire started. By the time the vessel was moved to a place of safety her superstructure and rigging had been practically destroyed. The five-masted schooner Paul Palmer and the four-masted schooner O. H. Brown were considerably damaged.

The burned area includes piers 1, 2 and 6, of the Grand Junction docks, and the pier on which stood the big grain elevator, all owned by the Boston and Albany Railroad Company. The piers destroyed were each about 800 feet long, and from 200 to 300 feet wide. Pier 1, 2 and 6 were covered each by a large warehouse extending over the entire length and breadth of the wharves. Between piers 2 and 6 was the pier upon which the elevator stood.

THE INLAND FISHERIES

The International Commission Meets Today at Eastport, Me.

Washington, July 8.—On Thursday at Eastport, Me., there will be a meeting of the Canadian and American commissioners appointed to investigate conditions and report on a uniform code of statutes governing the inland fisheries between Canada and the United States.

This commission was appointed in conformity with a treaty between Great Britain and the United States ratified at the last session of the Senate, and its personnel is made up of S. T. Basterdo, the Canadian commissioner from Ottawa, and David Starr Jordan of California. Mr. Jordan will be assisted by two experts from the American Fisheries Bureau, B. W. Evermann and A. B. Alexander, while the Canadian commissioner also will have the assistance of experts.

From the Bay of Fundy to Cape Flattery, Washington, the commissioners will prosecute their work, investigating local conditions, listening to grievances and examining and reporting on the laws of both Canada and the United States governing the fishing industry.

QUEBEC'S SURPLUS OVER A MILLION

Treasurer Weil's Estimate of a Million Dollars Largely Exceeded.

Montreal, July 8.—Some time ago Hon. W. A. Weil, provincial treasurer, predicted a surplus of \$1,000,000 for this year. The fiscal year ended June 30. After paying all ordinary and extraordinary expenditures for the past year, including items that are sometimes charged to capital account, and after paying \$50,000 of \$100,000 voted for the Quebec Tercentenary, the whole of which could legitimately have been held over to the following year, and after settling up a number of back obligations, which have been left in suspense from previous years, there still remains a sum of several thousands in excess of the round million, with some further collections yet to be made.

WANTS 1,500 MEN.

Ottawa, July 8.—The G. T. Pacific want 1,500 men to go on construction work west of Winnipeg. They are asking the Government if in case they cannot get them in Canada, they may go to the United States for help in contravention of the alien labor law.

OLYMPIC SHOOTING.

Blaisy, July 8.—Dull weather, with a threatening wind, threatened early this morning to interfere with the opening of the Olympic rifle shooting contests. By noon, however, the weather had improved, and some good scoring was recorded in the 300-metre team competition, and in the individual single and double shot matches, with running deer as a target.

BANNER CHEER FOR BILL BRYAN

Twelve Thousand in an Ovation Which Lasted One Hour and Twenty Minutes.

Denver, Colo., July 8.—The Democratic national convention is marking time, so far as the nomination of candidates and the adoption of a platform are concerned, and is passing through the stages of organization and the throes of frenzied demonstrations. Today has been marked chiefly by turbulent enthusiasm and the bitter strife of party leaders, the essential developments of the day being these:

Two sessions of the convention were held, the first at noon, producing a Bryan demonstration breaking all records in duration; the second at 8 o'clock, being the culmination of the struggle over the credentials of the Pennsylvania delegations and the supremacy of the Pennsylvania leader, Colonel Guffy, who has been denounced by Mr. Bryan. Outside of the convention, the committees have proceeded with the serious work of preparing the way for convention action. The credentials committee unseated eight of Colonel Guffy's anti-Bryan Pennsylvania delegates, thus reversing the complexion of the Pennsylvania delegation from anti-Bryan to Bryan, and precipitating the intense controversy which is being fought out before the night session of the convention.

Platform Making.

The platform is still in an incomplete condition, and will not be presented until tomorrow, but its essential features are agreed upon and little remains but the details of phrasing.

Exploded an Ovation.

The early meeting of the convention today was productive of little practical progress, as the principal committees were not ready to report. But it had the effect of exploding the long pent-up Bryan enthusiasm, which took the signal from Senator Gore's eloquent reference to the Nebraska leader, and burst into a whirlwind of enthusiasm lasting one hour and nineteen minutes with seven minutes more of the expiring echoes of clamor, establishing the convention record of an hour and twenty-six minutes, or full 39 minutes in excess of Roosevelt's demonstration at Chicago, which held the record until today. It was a decisive exhibition of the overwhelming strength of the Bryan column, and one of the most dramatic convention pictures ever presented, as the standards of the states were torn from their moorings, and borne through the hall until they stood together on the platform, like an army of banners, proclaiming their united allegiance to Bryan.

Amid this scene of Bryan demonstration the six standards of New York, New Jersey, Delaware, Georgia, Minnesota and Connecticut stood rooted in their places, and rallying points of little groups unmoved by the frenzied scenes about them. Throughout the hour and nineteen minutes, the deafening uproar continued, ebbling and flowing in enthusiasm. Women joined with the men in bearing down the Bryan standard aloft, while the whole assemblage of 12,000 persons joined in the tumultuous demonstration.

The early session lasted three hours, men worn out with excitement, and lacking the material to proceed, the convention recessed until tonight.

C. P. R. BOAT WON EXCITING RACE

Steamer Assiniboia Defeated the Huronic in Race to Soo From Fort William.

Soo, Ont., July 8.—The result of the race between the Huronic of the Northern Navigation Company, and the Assiniboia of the C. P. R. fleet, was a victory for the Assiniboia, which arrived at the head of the locks at 5.25 this morning, about ten minutes earlier than the Huronic.

The trip down Lake Superior was a most exciting one. The Huronic was three minutes later than the C. P. R. boat in starting, leaving Fort William at 1 o'clock yesterday afternoon, and soon caught up. Neither boat had any advantage until six o'clock, when the Assiniboia took the lead and held it right to the Soo. It is seldom that a race of 270 miles lasting over seventeen hours, results in such a close finish.

This morning at the Government dock Commodore Anderson of the Assiniboia, was presented by Mayor Thompson on behalf of the citizens of the city, with a handsome chair. His worship also read an address to which Capt. Anderson responded suitably.

The town band headed a procession of citizens to the dock, where, for a short time, high carnival was held.

Advertiser Correspondence

The Water Problem.

To the Editor of The Advertiser:

It is admitted on all hands that there is necessity for action in the matter of the water supply of the city. The vote just taken has shown rather conclusively that the citizens refuse to drink river water, and also that the ratepayers in general are not in favor of paying for a high pressure system, and hence the water to be raised by the favored few. I would be one of the favored few, myself, in case such a scheme carried, but as the total saving is expected to be greater than the total expense, I think it would only be fair that those who save should pay all the cost. The scheme recently defeated would doubtless have had a greater majority recorded against it if the voters had understood that the spring water from the north branch was coming to the city in the same pipe as the river water. I have never quite understood by what kind of magic it was intended that the citizens should be able to draw a glass of pure spring water for drinking, or a can-full of river water for the garden, out of the same tap.

It seems to me that the great need at present is to submit a scheme which the people will accept, and after the defeat of two complete but costly schemes, it seems that a spring water addition, of small cost, is the only thing that can be carried at present. The strength of the spring water sentiment of London hardly needs comment. In spite of the united efforts of three newspapers and advertisements privately paid for, it defeated the recent scheme because that it was not purely a spring water scheme, and the same sentiment almost carried the Komoka scheme, in spite of the united opposition of the forces mentioned above.

The commission has this year a cash

surplus of something like ten or twenty thousand dollars. The Kilworth addition will necessitate an annual expense of about eight thousand dollars, and will provide at the least calculation 500,000 gallons. If past history repeats itself, the product of the Kilworth addition may run to the neighborhood of a million gallons. A half a million gallons when sold will yield a revenue of thirteen thousand dollars, so that if this scheme is offered to the people, one strong argument in its favor will be that the money is on hand to pay for it; another one will be that when it is used up we will have several thousands added to our annual net profits. These facts would strengthen the scheme in the eyes of the public, to such an extent that it would probably
