

FRASER'S BURIAL.

General Fraser was one of those brave and generous men whose fate excites the sympathy equally of friend and foe. He was captured among the very bravest of the British Army, and was picked off, by one of several sharpshooters, whom he had stationed in trees for that purpose. He was buried at six o'clock, p.m. on a hill near Saratoga, where a breast-work had been constructed.

At the hour the corpse was removed, and we saw all the Generals, with their retinues, on the hill, assisting at the funeral ceremony. The English Chaplain, Mr. Brindley officiated. Cannon balls flew around and above the assembled mourners. General Gates protested afterwards, that had he known what was going on, he would have stopped the fire immediately. Many cannon-balls flew close by me, but my whole attention was engaged by the funeral scene, where I saw my husband exposed to imminent danger.

The incessant cannonade during the solemnity, the steady attitude and unaltered voice with which the chaplain officiated, though frequently covered with dust, which the shot threw upon all sides of him; the mute but expressive mixture of sensibility and indignation upon every countenance; those objects will remain to the last of my life upon the mind of every man who was present.
