

THE BARRIER OF FLAME

OFFICERS ARE LIARS, SAYS HON. MR. HUGHES

Ottawa, March 31—There was a lively session of the boots inquiry committee today. Major General Sam Hughes. minister of militia, was on the stan. and asserted his views with exact vehimence. When confronted the sworm statement of the officers that soldiers had been forced to tie shingles and bags to their feet because their boots gave but, the minister denounced the officers as liars and said they should be dismissed from the service.

He refused to accept criticism of General Alderson or the findings of the seventy-three military boards who condemned the footwear. He admitted that some of the boots were bad and made terrible but vague threats about what he would do to the manufacturers if he could. The minister sought to shift the blame, however, by saying that most of the contracts were made by Hon. J. D. Hazen when acting as minister of militia with the assistance of the premier. A striking example of the profits of the middleman was given to the committee this afternoon. On 17,000 pairs of the middleman was given to the commission of \$15,275, while the company shoes, which the Gauthier company, of Quebec, sold to the government through Charles E. Slater, the latter got a commission of \$15,275, while the company which made the boots made a profit of my \$6,650 on the boots. The Gauthier company made a profit of twenty-five ents per pair and Slater took a commission of fifty-seven and a half cents per pair.
