STRONGER GRIP ON GERMANS IN CANADA

BRITAIN STAVED OFF WAR BETWEEN JAPAN AND CHINA. London, May 12.—A Shanghai despatch to the Post quotes one of the chief Chinese newspapers as asserting that China's acceptance of Japan's ultimatum was due entirely to British mediation.
