MANY ATTEND M.L.A.'S FUNERAL

Schools and Stores Closed as
Late J. M. Flewelling
Laid to Rest

Premier Baxter, Ministers, and
Rotary Club Officials Are
Present

ST. STEPHEN, Nov. 4.—The funeral of John M. Flewelling, late M. L. A. elect for St. Stephen-Milltown, took place this afternoon. A short service was held at the house. Afterwards the body was taken to Trinity church where public service was held. The church was crowded with friends who wished to pay their last respect to a man who had won a place in the hearts of all who knew him.

ATTENDED FUNERAL

The pall-bearers were Hon. Dr. Fay, Hon. St. George, Minister of Public Health; N. Marks, M. L. A., Charles E. Huestis, M. N. Cockburn, K. C., A. R. McKenle and Dr. C. G. Main, of this town. Among those who had come from out of town to attend the funeral were Premier Baxter, Thomas Bell, M. P., and Mr. Justice Grimmer, of Saint John; C. D. Richards, Minister of Lands and Mines, and R. S. Barker, Fredericton, and W. R. Allen, of Montreal, who came as a representative of the Montreal Rotary Club.

The schools were all closed this afternoon and all places of business were closed during the time of the funeral service. A large funeral procession accompanied the body to its last resting place in St. Stephen rural cemetery.

A membership campaign in the interests of the Retail Merchants' Association is being inaugurated throughout Canada. The New Brunswick Provincial Board has opened its campaign in Saint John already and in view of the fact that this week marks the 11th anniversary of the association in this province, the executive members are stimulated with greater enthusiasm.

Each executive member is making it his special duty to bring in a new member for the association. It is expected that by the middle of December there will be at least an increase of 50 per cent. in the provincial association.

Drives will be made in each city and town throughout the province. The association is already well represented by nearly all the larger firms of the province and it is hoped that, when the drive ends, it will have been successful in bringing in most of the smaller retail concerns.

Cold Developed on 40-Mile Hike Fatal

BEAR RIVER, Nov. 4.—The death of Leland Robbins, eldest son of Mrs. Harriette Robbins, occurred at his home yesterday at the age of 17. He was active in Boy Scout work, having taken a 40-mile hike two weeks ago and contracted a cold, which proved fatal. His father, the late Valentine Robbins, was a private in the 8th Battalion and was killed in action in the Battle of Ypres.

He is survived by his mother and one brother, Clayton, at home.

Shed and Wood Are Burned at Chatham

CHATHAM, Nov. 4.—Fire broke out early this morning in a shed at the rear of the house occupied by Gordon Blakey, and for a time nearby houses were threatened owing to the proportions assumed by the blaze. Good work on the part of the fire department confined the blaze to its source. A considerable quantity of wood, the property of Ronald Duplacey, was stored in the shed, and this went up in flames.

Traders Stand Pat With Tubers at \$7

PRESQUE ISLE, Me., Nov. 4.—Both growers and buyers stand pat in the potato market today, which held steady at \$7 per barrel, cash, to growers, bulk barrel measure for Green Mountain No. 1. As usual some lots here and there changed hands at above market figures, at \$7.25 and \$7.50, and fancy seed lots higher.

Weather conditions are better with higher temperature. Growers are holding back for higher prices and none believe that the peak of the market has been anywhere near reached.

SAYS PROTESTANTS INCLUDES HEBREWS

Argument Offered by Lawyer
Regarding School Law in
Quebec

OTTAWA, Nov. 4.—In the Supreme Court of Canada this afternoon, argument was continued by Wallace Nesbitt, K. C., on the appeal from a recent judgment of the Quebec court of appeal which ruled that the legislation enacted by the Quebec legislature in 1908 to the effect that, for school purposes, Jews should be regarded as "Protestants," was ultra vires of the Quebec legislature.

The term "Protestant," contended Mr. Nesbitt, in all provincial school education, includes all persons who are non-Catholics. He cited the Marriage Act of Lower Canada, passed in 1861, which he declared, bore out this contention.

C. P. HUDSON BAY RAIL PLAN DENIED

Company Has No Idea of Building
to Fort Churchill, Says
Coleman

WINNIPEG, Nov. 4.—"The company has no intention of building a line to Fort Churchill, on the Hudson Bay," declared D. C. Coleman, vice-president, Western lines, Canadian Pacific Railway, here today when advised of a report that the C. P. R.

planned the construction of a branch line through The Pas mineral belt. A local paper carried the report from its Ottawa correspondent and it said the "ultimate destination of the line would be Fort Churchill."

"There was," said Mr. Coleman, "a survey of a proposed Prince Albert to Herb Lake line, but construction is not contemplated at the present time." (Herb Lake is a mining district of Northern Manitoba, near The Pas.)
