



round. It also oncred a bonus for both ter quality. Having by this means assured a reg-ular and pure supply, the council gave 'ts attention to improving the methods of distribution. Private vendors were formed into distributing companies

its attention to improving the methods of distribution. Private vendors were different into distributing companies with a guarantee of three years' tenure, und the city was divided into blocks— one company to each block—so that the loss arising from the overlapping of milk rounds should be ended. The three years' term ended last July, and the council, being unable to obtain sat-isfactory tenders for future private de-livery, undertook the distribution itself. Two important departures were made in the method of distribution, and sale. First, all milk was delivered in sealed bottles, and, second, all pay-ments were made by coupons or tokens, which customers were required to purchase in advance. In spite of the natural difficulty of introducing the new system and of trouble with one company, which compelled the council to control the delivery earlier than was antcipated, the scheme was in working order in less than a week. The people are now thoroughly sp-preciative of the purity and full meas-ure assured by the sealed bottle system. So far as can be ascertained by comparison with other cities in New Zealand, the economics effected in dis-tribution in Wellington have been suf-ficient to meet the cost of the measures taken to assure purity and good qual-lity.
