BOYAGE THROUGH SHOWER OF GLASS

London, Dec. 24. (By mail.)—A small vessel's weird voyage through a big shower of volcanic glass has been reported to "Nature" by Grenville A. J. Cole. The circumstances are worthy of a Jules Verne story, and have been made public through the courtesy of Dr. Russell, director of the Fisheries Laboratory of the Admiralty, and J. W. Carruthers. When the steam trawler Prince of Wales was off the west of Yarmouth, in the North Atlantic, the captain reported to the mate that land had appeared to the port quarter. A heavy storm soon enveloped the vessel. The storm lasted for the unusually long period of six hours. At the first sight of the appearance of land, the vessel was covered with a deposit from stem to stern. This deposit was found to consist of volcanic glass. The material is a characteristic dark, granular, and somewhat crystalline substance, which the meteorological office records that the position of the fall lay in a cyclonic depression, with a windward east of south, blowing at sixteen miles an hour, says the report. It is thought that some account of the storm may be forthcoming from the island of the Faroe group. It is most probable the storm was a depression in Iceland, the dust having in that case traveled 800 miles. France's best cognac comes from the city of Cognac.

Pastors in South Sea, Marie Adopt Restriction.

Sault Ste. Marie, Mich., Dec. 27.—The pastor of every church in Sault Ste. Marie, except one, has signed an agreement not to perform any marriage ceremony in which either party has a former husband or wife living. The agreement follows:

"We, the undersigned, viewing with dismay the growing evil of divorce which is so grievously destroying the sanctity and integrity and lowering the ideals of married life, desire to put ourselves on record as being unwilling to perform any marriage ceremony in which either party to the same should have a former husband or wife living. We make this statement in order that to one in the future may be put to the embarrassment of being refused."

ROBBERS TORTURE WOMAN.

Mrs. Fancely of Cleveland, Silent on Money, Is Thrown Into Fire.

Cleveland, Ohio, Dec. 27.—Two robbers bound, gagged and badly beat Mrs. Eleanor Fancely, and then, after her repeated assertion that \$10 in cash and a check for \$800 was all the funds she had in the house and her refusal to tell of a secret hiding place of her money, tied a garment about her face and threw her into a pile of blazing newspapers, from which she was rescued by firemen.

Her clothing was scorched and she was almost suffocated by smoke. The robbers escaped.

PERISHED IN SIERRAS.

Young Ranchers Lost in California Mountains.

Henry Smith of Tryon, P. E. I., has received word of the death of his two nephews, Richard Smith, twenty-five, and his brother Arthur, twenty-one, of Round Valley, Ontario, C. W. California, sons of L. V. Smith, both perished in the snows of the Sierra Mountains. They had left home on horseback to close down the gates of Horton Lake, from whence comes the stream which irrigated the Smith ranch. They rode to a steep canyon, left their horses, and proceeded on their way afoot to the lake four miles away.

On their return they lost the trail, were out all night, and, searching for the trail, were killed by a five-foot snow drift.

Richard was lying rigid in death; Arthur was sitting up and still living. He smiled faintly at his rescuers and said: "Oh, you boys have come!" These were his last words; he died next morning.

BIBLE BUDGET IS \$1,540,000.

Increase of \$400,000 Over Last Year Voted by Directors.

New York, Dec. 27.—The American Bible Society, Bible House, Astor Place, has increased its budget for 1923 over that of the budget for 1922 by \$400,000. The 1923 budget was placed at \$1,540,000 for the translation, publication and distribution of Bibles. The announcement was made last evening by Frank H. Mann, one of the secretaries of the society.

The amount voted will be used in furnishing the Scriptures in more than 150 languages and dialects for practically every country in the world.

The Royal Commission on Pensions and Re-Establishment will hold sittings, beginning about January 18th, 1923, (definite dates to be announced later) in Halifax, St. John, Montreal, Vancouver, Calgary, Regina, Winnipeg and Toronto, in the order named.

To enable a report to be made during the ensuing session of Parliament it is possible and to ensure that evidence of the above places is presented at not more than six duly selected representative witnesses.
