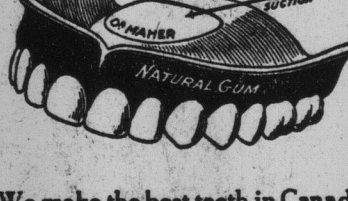
Roland Fleet, 30, of Halifax, hanged himself in his cell in Dorchester Penitentiary. He had been sentenced to two years.

SCHOOL BOARD MATTERS

At a special meeting of the school board last evening estimates for the ensuing year were submitted, indicating a total of nearly \$200,000. It was moved that Bishop LeBlanc be granted a rental of \$6,250 a year for the new high school building in Cliff street, but the motion was defeated by a vote of five to four. It was agreed that an increase of \$100 a year be granted to Mr. Roberts, city school carpenter.

Mr. Emerson said that the board had an overdraft account of \$45,000, largely due to the cost of coal and the raise in the teachers' salaries. Dr. Bridges thought that it would be a good scheme to give the children a two months' holiday in the winter and continue school in the summer.

Mr. Ingraham said he had been spoken to by Rev. J. J. O'Donovan stating that the rental for St. Patrick's hall was too low; hardwood floors had been put in the building and the ceilings had been renewed. H. Colby Smith moved, seconded by Mr. Day, that Father O'Donovan be granted \$80 a year for each room, or \$400 in all. The motion was carried.

Mr. Nagle said that the rental of St. Joseph's school had been cut down to \$1,000 last year with the agreement that it would be looked into again this year. A committee of five was appointed to consider the rental.

Mr. Nagle's motion asking that \$8,250 be paid as rental for the new Cliff street school was lost by a vote of five to four. Dr. Manning said that he thought all the city schools should be owned by the public, and that he was very much opposed to the principle of having two sets of schools in the city.

Mr. Nagle said that this was just opening an old question.

"ECONOMIST" HAS PRAISE FOR PRESIDENT WILSON.

London, Dec. 20.—(Correspondence)—President Wilson is praised by the Economist as "the man who can express clearly and without bombast the fine ideals which are the real war aims of the Allies." The article says that had such a spokesman been found earlier the sympathy and support of Russia might permanently have been enlisted on the side of the Allies. The paper asserts also that President Wilson agrees with Lord Lansdowne's much discussed statement that the Allies have no desire to deny to Germany her place among the great commercial communities of the world.

"We find," said the Economist, "that well informed opinion in the city is very strong on this point—that it would be very difficult if not impossible, to impose an economic boycott on Germany in time of peace. Such threats have the unfortunate effect of stimulating the war interest of the commercial classes in Germany when their instincts and interests impel them so strongly toward the reasonable peace that President Wilson offers."

Rev. Thomas Stebbings, who died on Monday at Seckville, was a brother-in-law of Rev. H. A. Goodwin, pastor of the Centenary church. The latter left this morning to attend the funeral.

MUST SUBSCRIBE TO WAR LOAN IN NEW ZEALAND.

Auckland, New Zealand, Dec. 8.—(Correspondence)—New Zealand has taken the first step toward compulsory lending. A bill which has passed the house of representatives provides that persons with taxable incomes of \$3,000 and more must subscribe to the war loan three times the total amount which they pay in land tax and income tax. There are also provisions for penalizing persons who had not subscribed to the previous war loan.
