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STORIES OF A FAMOUS OLD LONDON CLUB

Cocoa Tree the Haunt of Addison, Gibbon, Byron and Other Lights

NECKLESS GAMBLING

Fortunes Won and Lost—Unblush- ing Political Bribery—Is About to Affiliate With American Universities Club—Prominent Canadian Members

(Times' Special Correspondence)
London, Nov. 20.—That inimitable bird, the American Eagle, has annexed yet another "literary landmark" in this coun- try, in the shape of the famous Cocoa Tree Club, in St. James street, London, the favorite haunt of Addison, Gibbon, and Lord Byron, the ancient stronghold of the English Tories, and the scene of some of the liveliest gambling in the history of the town.

"Up to now we have been affiliated with the New Oxford and Cambridge Club, in Pall Mall," said George Knowles (a.k.a. 92), the organizer and chairman of the American Universities Club, yesterday, "but we want to change our atmosphere a little, and to do this we have decided to go to the Cocoa Tree Club, which was founded in 1690, as a temporary abode for place for American college and university men abroad, now has a membership of more than 300, representing every Ameri- can state and Canadian province.

"The Cocoa Tree Club is not, like so many other historical relics in England, to pass into American hands, lock, stock and barrel, but, while preserving its identity as one of the most high class and exclusive of London clubs, will afford a home also, from the beginning of January next to the American Universities Club of London. The last named institution, which was founded in 1910, as a temporary abode for place for American college and university men abroad, now has a membership of more than 300, representing every Ameri- can state and Canadian province.
