METHODIST  
CONFERENCE

Charlottetown, June 16.—The Methodist conference closed tonight with public meeting addressed by Rev. S. T. Bartlett, of Toronto, general secretary of the conference, and J. W. Annet, of Toronto, secretary of the laymen's mission society.

The feature of the morning session was an address by Rev. J. W. Aikens, of Toronto, general secretary of the conference, on the subject of "The Moral and Social Reform Committee for Canada." He dealt with the measures taken to fight intemperance, the white slave traffic and other social evils and emphasized the need of co-operation between philanthropists and official forces.

The conference passed a resolution of appreciation of his work.

The following laymen were appointed on the special conference committee for the year: W. D. Baskin, G. A. Henderson, J. J. Weddall, R. R. Machum, F. O. Sullivan, J. A. Lindsay.

Rev. R. G. Fulton, of Chatham, limited an invitation would be extended to the conference to meet there next year, but owing to difficulty in billeting delegates he raised from \$1 to \$8. This provoked considerable discussion in which many members took part. Opinion was divided as to whether ministers should pay their own travelling expenses and their board or not. Some maintained that the change would mean a loss of the social element of the conference, others a loss of self-respect in accepting entertainment. The matter was settled by referring the whole question as to place and conditions to the conference special committee.

The Moral and Social Reform Council of Canada was urged to ask the federal parliament to amend section 298 of the criminal code, to make more effective the meaning of the words immoral, indecent, obscene, as the present meaning is capable of such interpretation as to prevent enforcement of the law as applied to theatrical performances.

Regret was expressed that the criminal code leaves the way open for the patronage of betting and gambling to those who claim social leadership, the so-called distinguished patronage and all efforts so far have failed to extinguish it.

Satisfaction was expressed at the steps being taken by Presbyterians and Methodists to establish a girls' industrial school in the maritime provinces. Conference urged the dominion parliament to place so-called boxing bouts in same category as prize-fights which are a violation of the criminal code.

The following were appointed representatives from the conferences to the conference: Rev. Leonard J. Watson, Rev. Neil McLaughlin, Messrs. C. Fraser, McFavish, W. D. Baskin, Rev. W. G. Lane was appointed representative of the general conference board and the following members of the Dominion Alliance Council: Revs. George Morris, H. E. Thomas, C. F. McFavish, A. C. M. Lawson.

A resolution of appreciation of the services of Rev. Dr. Carman was unanimously passed.

In ringing tones vibrant with spiritual fervor, Rev. Dr. Carman, the "Grand Old Man" of Methodism in Canada, delivered a parting message with powerful eloquence to members of the conference at the closing session tonight.

"The church is now face to face with the greatest task under heaven," he said. "May you be quickened with supernatural energy. Let no look nor theory drag you into materialism."

The general conference officers who were in attendance here leave tomorrow for New Glasgow to attend the Nova Scotia conference.

LUMBERMEN ORGANIZE  
TO PROTECT INTERESTS

The Lumbermen & Lumber Holders' Association of New Brunswick is to be revived if the plan outlined at a meeting of provincial lumbermen in the Royal hotel yesterday, are carried out. A committee will arrange the details and the reorganization meeting will likely take place in Newcastle during the last week in June.

The visiting lumbermen did not remain over to present their case to the government meeting today, but as was expected might be done, but after the organization meeting the government may be approached at their July meeting. The chief object of the association is understood to be the securing of better terms for renewal of crown land leases, which expire in 1918, than those outlined in the recent act by which a bonus for renewal is required.

WILL STOP  
MUD DUMPING  
IN HARBOR

Firms dumping mud into the harbor are liable to prosecution and it is likely that action will be taken in the police court against some of the dredging contractors if Commissioner Schofield obtains the necessary evidence. At the meeting of the city commissioners yesterday afternoon the matter was discussed and there was a strong protest on the part of the commissioners against the practice.

On recommendation of Commissioner McEellan, it was decided to appoint George Drake and William H. McLeod as honorary substitutes of the fire department and the chamberlain was instructed to pay them their annual allowance at once. These men have been members of the department for fifty years, and it is proposed to make the same arrangements in regard to other long-service men.

The commissioner of public works was also authorized to appoint a man as guard for the old burying ground. He is to be solely under the control of the commissioner, and is to be sworn in as a special policeman.

The engineer was authorized to prepare grades for the North End streets while making a survey for the street lines.

The plans and specifications of the proposed extensions to the water and sewerage system of Lancaster were approved by the commissioners and copies of the plans and specifications will be on file in the office of the common clerk.

The appraisers who had under consideration the matter of settling a price which the city is to pay for a building on one of the city lots in Queens ward and owned by Robert J. Sparrow, refused to make a survey for the street lines.

The meeting then adjourned to assemble at noon today, when tenders for water and sewerage excavations will be received.

URGE RECIPROCAL  
CAR DEMURRAGE

Ottawa, June 16.—"What is sauce for the goose is sauce for the gander," said M. K. Cowan, K. C., this morning in justifying the application of Canadian shippers for the institution in the dominion of reciprocal car demurrage, a system which would fine the railways as well as the shipper for delay in the unloading of cars.

F. E. Walsh, traffic expert for the Canadian Manufacturers' Association stated the shippers would be willing to let the penalties imposed on the railways go to the crown, if desired, if only they would have the desired effect of bettering car service.

That under present conditions a railroad could not call its car its own, was the statement made by Transportation Superintendent Crombie, of the Grand Trunk railway, today, when the railways commenced their argument against the adoption of an average reciprocal demurrage before the board of railway commissioners.
