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POLICE GUARD
GOVERNOR FOSS

Warning of Black Hand Plot
Believed to Be the Cause of
the Unusual Precautions.

Boston, Jan. 18.—Years that the safety
of Gov. Foss may be imperilled by Black
Hand agents from New York were ascribed
as the cause for remarkable precautions
taken yesterday and last night to guard
him.

Following an afternoon of unusual ac-
tivity on the part of both state and city
police, last night a cordon of police was
drawn tight about his house, 51 Belver-
street, Jamaica Plain, and throughout
the night the house was kept under con-
stant surveillance.

His every movement late yesterday
afternoon and last evening was made
with a police guard watching him and
ready for any emergency. State police
were on guard while he was dining at the
Hotel Bellevue. An air of mystery was
thrown about the whole matter by the
governor and the police, for they refused
to make any admission which would give
ground for the news which leaked out
that Black Hand men were feared.

Intimations received at the state house
yesterday of probable steps against the
governor by agents of the society led to
the police activity.

Extraordinary precautions were taken
at the State House yesterday afternoon
to guard the governor. Inspector Daly,
of the state police, was joined by Inspec-
tor Brady, of the district police. Visitors
to the State House, if they furnished
any cause for suspicion, were kept under
vigilant supervision.

Almost immediately the activity of the
police at the State House was reflected
in the Boston force. Commissioner O'Meara,
it is understood, was acquainted
with the situation and Chief Inspector
Dugan was assigned to work on the case.

Inspector Rooney was placed in charge
of the Italian policemen. No word of
their mission was given out by the police,
but it is considered that their knowledge
of the Italian language and, consequently,
their ability to handle more easily the
problems of searching for Black Hand
plots, made them the choice because of
the task facing the police.

They went first through the Sicilian set-
tlement in the West End and then in-
vaded the other Italian colony in the
North End. They questioned especially
the Italian keepers, seeking word of any
strange men who might be connected
with Black Hand societies. Their quest
was unsuccessful, and at midnight they
ended their search. The officers were
Cavagnaro and Ferrari, of station
104, at the South station platform. They
kept vigilant watch on incoming trains
and kept an eye on the movements of
Italians in the station to see whom they
met and what they did afterward.

The letters to Gov. Foss, it was re-
moved, came from New York. In view
of the trouble in Lawrence and the num-
ber of Italians involved in the strike
there, it was said last night that activity
of Black Hand men might have come as a
result of the labor troubles for Gov. Foss,
as head of the militia, might be held by
some as responsible for the quelling of
riots by the bayonets of state troops.
