THE EMPRESS OF BRITAIN

New York, Dec. 10.—General Henry Tremain, one of the founders of the Grand Army of the Republic, is dead. He was one of the founders and editors of the Daily Law Journal.

Paris, Dec. 10.—August Ballinger of the Aviation Corps today flew from Vincennes to Montreal in 100 miles in seventy minutes. Because of a high wind he maintained an average altitude of 4,900 feet.
