Cottons—Demand slack; primary
prices slightly softer; production above
normal.

Silks—Demand fair; prices firm;
production steady; demand steady;
advancing; production close to normal.

Furs—Demand light; prices steady;
production of garments light.

Apparel—Demand light; prices firm;
production gaining.

Leathers—Upper leathers less active;
sole leather demand improves; produc-
tion uneven; large sales of low grade
women's shoes made by retailers.

Jewelry—Staples steady; novelties
less sought; retailers slow in paying
bills, say jobbers.

Rubber—Crude prices easier because
of large imports; production continues
at capacity; production of goods un-
changed; copper lower; tin and quicksilver
decline; lead and zinc prices unchanged.

RUBBER PRICES EASIER

(New York Tribune, Saturday.)

Crude rubber prices continued their
downward trend yesterday. The present
price of rib-smoked sheets is 22 1/2
cents a pound, as contrasted with
thirty-three cents Thursday, and 33 1/2
cents Tuesday. Recent large imports
of crude rubber from London and di-
rect from the Far East are held largely
responsible for the present market
weakness. According to local advices
more than 20,000 tons monthly are be-
ing shipped from Singapore direct to
the United States. With yearly ship-
ments averaging 240,000 tons, many
manufacturers are showing less con-
cern about a shortage of crude rubber.

Some rubber manufacturers point out,
however, that the present situation is far
below requirements. Last year Amer-
ican manufacturers consumed ap-
proximately 300,000 tons of rubber, and
with many factories now running at
capacity it is difficult to see these con-
sumers say, how consumption will be
less this year than it was in 1922.
