## AGED ADMIRAL MARRIED

HIS YOUTHFUL BRIDE DAUGHTER OF THE FAMOUS IRISH POET.

Boston, July 26.—Japan's "Yankee admiral" Henry Walton Grinnell, has married Miss Florence Mary Roche, daughter of the late James Jeffrey Roche, the Irish poet and patriot. The ceremony was performed in the Roman Catholic Cathedral of the Holy Cross, in the presence of relatives and a few friends. Admiral Grinnell is 74 years old, and was an intimate friend of the father of the bride, who is 25 years old. Admiral Grinnell served with Farragut at Mobile Bay and later was in the naval service of one of the South American republics. Still later he was adviser in the Japanese naval establish- ment, previous to the Chinese-Japan- ese war, and for his services was made admiral in the Mikado's fleet.

## TENDED HIS VICTIM

James Bourke is Nevertheless Charged With Murder.

## TOOK HIM TO HOSPITAL

After Working For Two Weeks For George Matthews, Whom He Injured in a Fight, North Bay Man Gets Him to Toronto Hospital Where His Patient Expires—Dying Man Freed Bourke.

Toronto, July 28.—To carry a man about the country, nursing him as a mother because he was the cause of his injuries, to have the man die just as he had got him within the doors of Toronto General Hospital, where he had hoped he would be cured, and then to be taken into custody by the police, charged with his murder, is the experience of James Bourke, erst- while butcher on the Bay, which reached its climax at local police headquarters yesterday morning. Bourke two weeks ago sold out his business.

## JOHN EWAN IS DEAD

Great Liberal Journalist Passes Away in Toronto.

## BELOVED BY COLLEAGUES

Associate-Editor of The Globe and One of Canada's Most Famous Newspapermen Succumbs to Cancer—He Was War Correspondent in Cuba and South Africa—Born in Aberdeenshire in 1854.

Toronto, July 28.—After months of suffering, John Alexander Ewan, asso- ciate editor of The Globe, died at 140 yesterday morning at his home, 10 Victoria avenue. Born in Aberdeen, Scotland, in 1854, he came to Toronto when a boy and learned the typographical art in the Globe office. In 1879 he went on the reporting staff and later reported for The Mail and Empire at Ottawa. Then for a time he was editorial writer on The World, returning to The Globe in 1892. In 1897 he became widely known as a writer of a series of articles on life and conditions in Quebec, achiev- ing a national reputation as war cor- respondent for The Globe in Cuba, and later in South Africa with the Canadian troops. He also "covered" the big Pennsylvania coal strike for his paper a score of years ago, and his last series of special articles

were on the Esplanade viaduct, gleaned from a trip to the United States. He was well known at the Ottawa Par- liament buildings. Mr. Ewan was president of the Civic Guild, a member of the Canadian, National and Ontario Clubs, an ex-pres- ident of the Ward Union Liberal Asso- ciation and a member of St. Mel- med's Church. He is survived by a widow and one daughter, a brother and two sisters, all in Toronto.

The Globe this morning says of him: "No one was so beloved by his colleagues of The Globe or by the other newspapermen throughout the Dominion, as well as an extraordinarily large circle of friends outside of newspaper work, as the late Mr. Ewan. Every newspaper man who visited Toronto in the course of his work or on pleasure bent, looked in on The Globe's associate editor for a friendly chat or exchange of opinions. To the younger newspapermen of the city he was a kindly godfather."

## 28,000 Will Go Out on Strike

Chicago, July 28.—A general strike of building trades was decided upon at yesterday's conference of thirty-seven unions, which met in a final effort to obtain settlement with the Otis Elevator Co.

By noon to-day it is said the strike order involved 28,000 men. The carpenters' union is the only one not af- fected, the representatives of that union at the conference declaring against a sympathetic strike. The cause of the strike is the refusal of the Otis Elevator Co. to remove mach- inists from elevator construction work.

## French and Turkish Clash

Constantinople, July 28.—The Porte has received a cipher telegram an- nouncing that there has been fight- ing on the frontier of Tunis and Tri- poli between French and Turkish troops. The Porte's information is to the effect that the French lost sev- eral hundred in killed and wounded.

## Staff College Course

Kingston, July 28.—Col. Robertson and Major Ward from England, will give a staff college course for four days next week in the Royal Military College for qualified officers who want to pass examinations in the Imperial Staff College. There will be 22 officers here for the course.

## Deckhand Drowned

Windsor, July 28.—Eugene Loroti, 18 years old, employed as a deck- hand on the steamer City of Hamil- ton of the Montreal & Lake Erie Steamship Co., was drowned of Hur- ley's dock at Windsor Tuesday night as the boat came alongside the dock to tie up.

## G.T.P. Surveyor Dead

Ottawa, July 28.—Capt. Geo. O'Far- nell, who was engaged in surveying on the Transcontinental Railway about a hundred miles west of La Tuque, is dead of appendicitis.

## SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN MONTHLY WEST LAND REGULATIONS

Any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Mani- toba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agen- cy for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intend- ing homesteader.

Duties.—Six months' residence upo and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 20 acres solely own- ed and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader is good standing may pre-empt a quar- ter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$8.00 per acre. Duties.—Must reside six months in each of six year from date of homestead entry (includ- ing the time required to earn homo- steader patent) and cultivate 50 acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may take a purchase homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties.—Must resid six months in each of three years, cul- tivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.
