LEARY ACCEPTS.

HE IS READY AND WILLING TO SIGN THE CONTRACT.

The conditions of the Council are unreasonable, but Mr. Leary has faith and confidence in the Government.

St. John, N. B., July 3, 1890.

To His Worship the Mayor of the City of St. John, and Public Department.

GENTLEMEN:—In reference to the resolution passed on the 13th of June last, by the Common Council of Saint John, I must say that I think it unreasonable to ask me to have the responsibility of obtaining the subsidies from the Dominion and Provincial governments before entering into contract for the erection of the deep water wharves, warehouses, and elevators.

In my communication dated the 11 of June, I undertook to proceed with the erection of the deep water wharves, etc., as set forth in that communication.

I have submitted herewith, on obtaining subsidies to the amount of \$80,000, five thousand dollars in addition to the sum guaranteed by the City, I undertake further to construct a wharf and elevator to obtain a further subsidy of \$50,000 five thousand dollars.

It seems to me unreasonable that I should be called on to contract for the work mentioned in my communication before any answer has been received from either the Dominion or Provincial Government to the memoranda which under the resolution of the Council were to be sent to those Governments.

Yet to show my good faith and confidence in the bodies I have to deal with, I am ready to sign the contract under the terms of the resolution of the Common Council of 13th June last.

A SHOCKING MURDER.

AN OLD MAN KILLED IN TORONTO LAST NIGHT.

Deaf with an Iron Lamp—He Dies in Hospital—Cause—Fatal Right Convulsion—Doctor's Diagnosis—A Hint.

Toronto, July 4.—A shocking murder occurred during last night at 121 Grand Trunk place, John Timothy, 68 years of age went to visit a friend named Hutton, in the house of a woman of dissolute character who lived with a man named August Patterson, in one of the rooms of the house. She was drunk and assaulted Timothy, during the male Patterson came in and beat the old man insensibly with an iron lamp. The place was covered with blood when the neighbors rushed in. Timothy died at the hospital at 11 o'clock this morning.

REFUSED TO BE SWORN.

MAGIE BOONEY SAYS SHE DOES NOT WANT TO BE SWORN BY THE JURY.

Only Two Witnesses Examined at the Inquest—The Government Witness, They have not much to say—The girl knows nothing about the case—The case is adjourned to the 11th inst.

An inquest into the cause of the death of Mrs. Isabella Brown was held by Coroner White at her late residence, Carleton, this morning. Two witnesses were examined, F. Nic and David Brown, a son of the deceased. The former knew very little of the case, and the latter refused to say much.

Margaret Booney, the daughter of the deceased, was then called. She also refused to testify but said that if she did her father would be sent to the penitentiary. She further said that her mother stated before death that it would be a bad thing for the father when she died.

The inquest was then postponed. The girl will likely be committed to jail until the government witness, Chief Clarke and Sgt. Ross made the inquest this morning. Mr. Brown and Mr. Clarke were the only witnesses.

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
