

Fox-Farming

Weights and Measures

The following sections of the Act Respecting Weights and Measures are published for general information:-

'Any person who shall use a beam scale. weight, or measure, in the sale or exchange of any commodity, not assayed and stamped, or who shall alter the same after being so assayed and stamped, or who shall use atcelyards, except for the purpo e of weighing hay or straw, or who shall use a beam made of wood, shall forfeit a sum not exceeding twenty dollars.'

PUBLIC NOTICE.

"Salt may be sold by measure, or by weight; if sold by measure, there shall be eighteen gallons to a tub (liquid measurement) and three tubs to a hogshead.
