### NO IMPORTED TRAMPS WANTED IN ST. JOHN

Three Cattlemen Who Attacked Andrew Patterson Will Be Sent Away.

Two drunks were fined in the police court this morning.

Ernest Doyle, Jas. Sinclair and James Gunning, all Scottish tramps, were remanded to jail for a day while an endeavor is made to have the people who dumped them into the city take them away. The men were charged with assaulting Andrew Patterson on Hill street last night.

Patterson told the court that the three men entered his pool room about eleven o'clock and were drinking. When they were being ejected they assaulted the complainant and one struck him over the head with a bottle cutting his head badly.

Policeman Marshall told of the arrest.

The men claimed to be cattlemen who were hired at Montreal, made a voyage on the steamer Manchester Importer, and were brought back here a few days ago as passengers and dumped on the city to be cared for. Two of the number said they wished to go to Campbellton to work on the railway, while a third said he was a sailor man who wanted to see on the big lakes, and that if allowed to go he would walk to Quebec for the purpose of getting a chance to ship.

The magistrate told them they looked their part, that of tramps. He said that the persons responsible for bringing this kind of men to the port and dumping them on the citizens to be cared for, should be obliged to get them out of the city. "We don't want such trouble as you in the city. We have enough without the touch of our hand to look after." His Honor gave instructions that the trio be locked up, and if those responsible for landing them here do not get them out of the city by tonight, the three men will be put on the chain gang for two months.
