Skeiners Have Accepted the

Reduced Wages.

MANCHESTER, Sept. 21—More than 400 cotton mills in Lancashire are idle today as a result of the dispute over wages between operatives and employers. This means that 40 million spindles are idle, more than 250,000,000 of capital is not bringing any return, and that 140,000 operatives are without work and losing over \$700,000 in wages a week. In view of the present glutted condition of the market it is not believed that this cessation of work will entail heavy damages to the employers. It is not felt here that the strike will last long for the card room workers are expected soon to take a second ballot and agree to the 5 per cent. reduction in wages which already has been accepted by the spinners. So far the idle operatives have been perfectly orderly.
