"THE GOOSE GIRL" IS SUBJECT OF LECTURE

BY MRS. MATTHEW HUMPERDINK'S MASTERPIECE DESCRIBED IN COURSE BEFORE LADIES' ASSOCIATION OF NATURAL HISTORY SOCIETY.

Mrs. G. F. Matthews, president of the Ladies' Association of the Natural History Society, was the lecturer on Wednesday afternoon on the subject of "The Goose Girl," which was Humperdink's Modern Opera. Mrs. Matthews explained this famous opera. She was assisted by Miss Alice Davidson who played the various motifs and the overtures to the three acts and many of the most important scenes, thus giving all a splendid idea of the music.

Mrs. Matthews after briefly explaining that Humperdink, who was born in 1854 and is still living and working hard, like Wagner, founded his opera on the German folktale, which was reason to hope that he may yet give the world other wonderful operas. The word "Kumpferdink" means royal children and the opera is founded on the story of the goose girl who lived in a witch's hut in the wood and was wooed by a king's son.

The first scene was the hut in the wood and showed the "goose girl" making a cake at the witch's orders. On this she cast a spell that whoever ate the half of it should die. The king's son ate the half and the witch's spell was broken. The king's son reached the city and engaged as a soldier with the king.

The whole populace was gone to the gate to greet the new ruler, the witch having told that the one who enters the city at noon shall be the king or queen. When the gate is opened the goose girl is seen and although the king's son recognizes her and claims her as queen, the people turn them both out and they wander away together. The third act shows them worn out with weariness and hunger. They reach the witch's hut and the wood-cutter and broom-maker who are there sell them the poisoned cake, which, failing to recognize, they eat and fall peacefully to sleep. The opera of course, introduced many other scenes and was most magnificently staged.

Mrs. Matthews's story of the play, the music of Miss Davidson, and the pictures that were shown at the close combined to give a general idea of the wonderful production.

At the close a vote of thanks, moved by Mrs. John Sealy and seconded by Mrs. E. S. Fisher, was tendered to Mrs. Matthews and other parts of the opera had given them.

On Wednesday afternoon next Mrs. Matthews will be giving a similar exposition of Humperdink's equally famous opera, Hansel and Gretel.

THE BOARD OF TRADE'S WORK FOR THE YEAR

Interesting Report to be Submitted at Annual Meeting on Monday

SLIGHT DEFICIT ON OLD HOME WEEK

Board, However, Feels that Advertising Received Through Literature Distributed on that Occasion was Well Worth Money.

The annual meeting of the Board of Trade will be held at 3:30 p. m. on Monday, when reports will be received and new officers elected. The nominations for officers are as follows: President—J. M. Robinson. For Vice-president—W. F. Burditt and J. A. Lefkoff. For the council—(Ten members to be chosen)—W. H. Barnaby, J. B. M. Baxter, F. de la C. Clements, L. G. F. Jones, W. C. Cross, M. W. Doherty, T. H. Estabrook, W. E. Foster, W. F. Hathe way, R. T. Hayes, C. H. Hallam, A. E. Massey, J. L. McAvity, F. B. Schofield, H. B. Schofield, Louis Simms, J. A. Tilton, W. H. Thorne, J. Hunter Wake.

The report of the council, which will be presented, refers to most of the work taken up during the year, and shows that the Board has considerably enlarged its activities.

Old Home Week.

The report thus refers to the Old Home Week: "The idea was to get back as many former residents as possible during the week and show them the development which was going on and which was contemplated for St. John and the province, with the hope of getting them to remain permanently. Committees were appointed and canvassed for funds, assistance to the amount of \$550.00 being sent in from former residents in England. Over 20,000 circulars setting forth the development, etc., going on in St. John and New Brunswick were mailed to former New Brunswickers now residing in the United States; other parts of Canada, and England, with hopes of illustrating the city and province. The Board's Finances.

The financial statement for the year ending November 15, shows the receipts of the board for the year amounted to \$26,418.68. The subscriptions and receipts for the sale of tickets, cards, jobs, etc., in connection with the Old Home Week celebration were \$4,031. The expenses of this affair were \$4,943.92, not counting \$356.53 spent on the Old Home Week banquet. The Board spent \$240 in connection with the commission government campaign. The salaries paid amounted to \$1,076.64; office assistance cost \$50.00. The selection of a secretary will be referred to the incoming council.
