Hon. Mr. Hazen Reviews Situation in Response to Enquiry.

EXPECTS INDUSTRY TO DEVELOP FURTHER

Wooden Shipbuilding Almost Lost Art in New Brunswick.

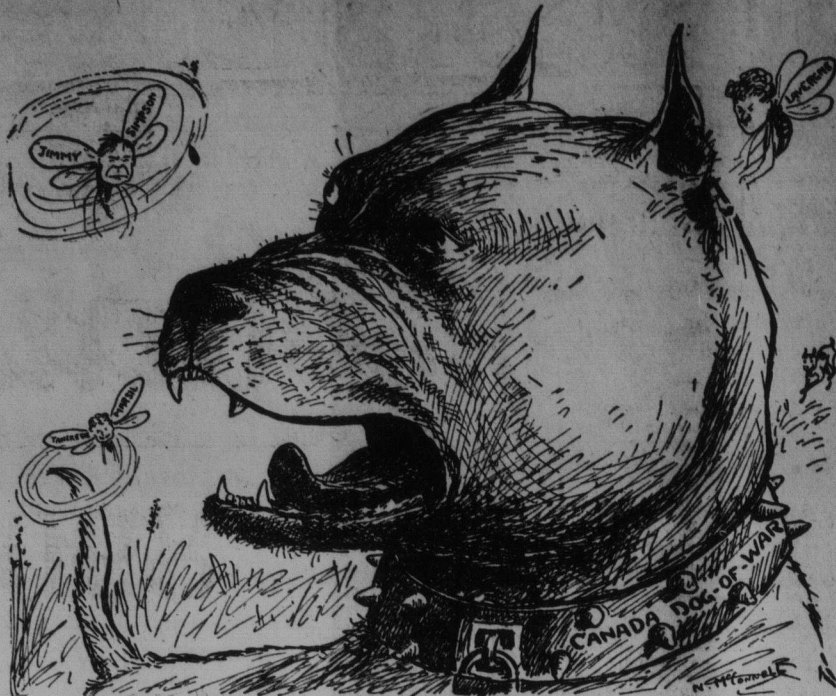
Ottawa, June 1 (Leased wire).—At the opening of the House this afternoon, Hon. Dr. Pugsley asked whether the suspended regulations had been the cause of affecting ships of the allies.

When the House went into committee of supply on the marine department estimates, Hon. Dr. Pugsley again brought up the question of governmental policy in regard to the construction of ships in Canada.

Hon. Mr. Hazen Replies. Hon. J. D. Hazen declared that the imperial munitions board could only obey instructions from the British government, and it had not secured any authorization to proceed with the construction of smaller vessels.

Mr. B. M. MacDonald said that the minister's reply held out little hope of any practical action by the government towards immediately encouraging the shipbuilding industry in Canada.

Mr. Hazen in reply said that a great many vessels were being built in Canada of which at the present time and under the present circumstances he was unable to give information to the House.



SIXTEEN N. B. SOLDIERS IN CASUALTIES

Ottawa, June 1.—There are 154 names in the noon casualty list today, including sixteen killed, seven died of wounds, twenty-two presumed dead and three missing.

He said there was more shipbuilding in Canada at the present time than for many years past, and he believed that when the war was over Canada would be able to compete with shipbuilders in the United Kingdom.

Hon. Mr. Hazen announced that on Monday he would introduce a bill regarding the Paulin Wireless Company, when he would make a statement explaining its terms.

THE TEUTONS AGAIN FAIL IN ATTACKS

Germans Force Back French, But Lose Later in the Day.

BRITISH CAPTURED 3,412 HUNS IN MAY

Violent Artillery Fire Continues in Northern France.

London, June 1.—During May the British forces in France captured 3,412 Germans, says the official statement from British headquarters issued tonight.

"During the month of May we captured, in operations in the battle area and in raids and minor operations on other portions of the front, 3,412 German prisoners, including 87 officers. We also took one German field gun, 80 machine guns and 21 trench mortars."

A hostile raiding party was driven off early this morning northwest of Bourles, on the Bapaume-Cambrai road. A party of our troops entered the enemy's positions south of Ypres and successfully bombed a number of occupied dugouts.

"On Wednesday night many long distance bombing raids were carried out by our airplanes with good results against hostile ammunition depots and railway stations. In the air fighting yesterday two German airplanes were brought down."

Paris, June 1.—In attacks north of Moulin de Laffaux, northeast of Soissons, the Germans today occupied elements of French advanced trenches, but later were expelled from them, according to the official communication issued tonight. The communication says:

NEW YORK HAS REAL WAR SCARE

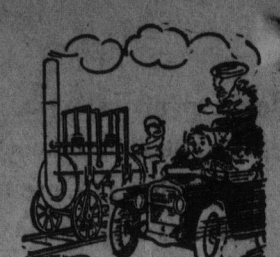
Port Closed Yesterday Forenoon for Some Reason—Three Big U. S. Vessels Sunk.

New York, June 1.—For reasons which navy yard and customs officials refused to reveal, the port of New York was closed today to all shipping, and the passage of vessels in or out was physically barred by the shutting of the gate in the steel net across the narrows which was placed there soon after the severance of diplomatic relations with Germany.

Lack of information as to the reason for the action inspired a crop of rumors, which found reflection in the stock market.

Washington, June 1.—Official announcement concerning the closing of the New York harbor today says the "action was taken by New York navy yard officials on their own authority," and that the report of what has been done "did not explain the reason for which the port was closed."

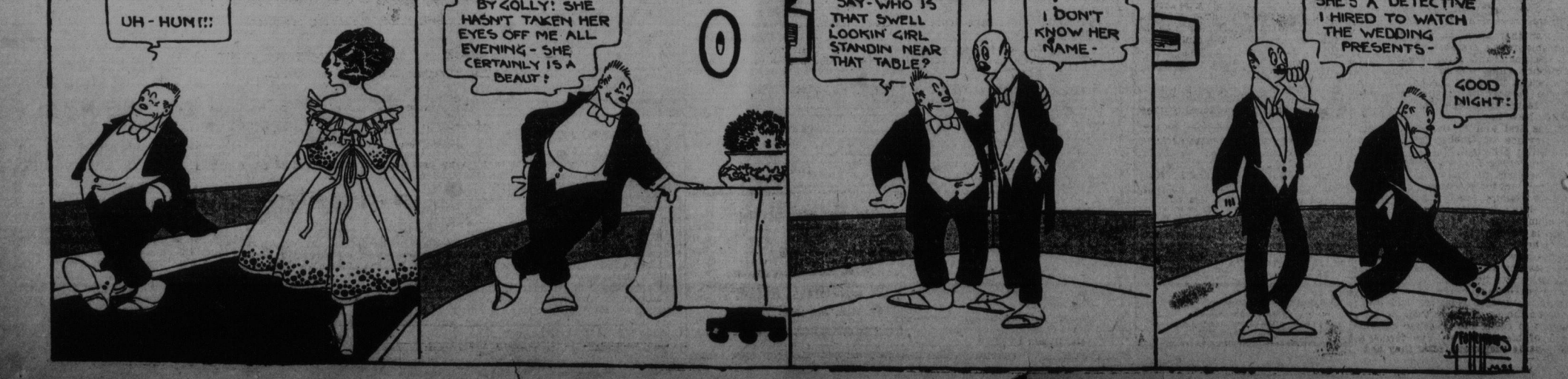
