### Rowing Revival Recalls Record Of Former Times

Belyea, Brayley and McCav-  
our Among the Youngsters  
Who Will Take Part in Big  
Rowing Features Here.

The entries for the boat race on the harbor on Thursday will recall to the minds of the older residents of the city the time when St. John was on the map as the home of the famous Paris crew and rowers of world-wide reputation.

In the race for the boys, Anthony Belyea, son of J. Fred Belyea, will be one of the rowers. This grandfather, James W. Belyea, was a winner of a match race on the Kennebecasis on August 17, 1871. Another lad, named Brayley, will compete on Thursday; he is a grand nephew of the Belyeas, who was James W. Belyea's opponent just forty-eight years ago. The match race, referred to above, was one of the big features in the racing world and the officials were members of the Paris crew and the Tyne crew.

The Daily Morning News dated at St. John, N. B., Friday, August 18, 1871, has the following account of the race:

"Yesterday morning a small number of persons left for Riverside in the early morning train to witness the scull race, which had been postponed from the day previous owing to unfavorable weather. At 8 o'clock the water was quite rough, and the prospect of the race coming off was very poor indeed. About 9 o'clock the wind died away, the water became quite calm and the scyces clouds occasionally showered down rain in sufficient quantities to refresh the earth if not to guarantee stillness of the waters. At this time matters looked bright for a splendid race; but for the judges had failed to put in an appearance, and the question of securing substitutes had to be settled. This caused some delay, but was finally settled by the choice of Mr. Bright of the Tyne crew and Mr. Ross of the Paris crew as judges, and Mr. O'Hanlon, backer of the Tyne crew, as referee. Belyea and Brayley then put themselves in rowing trim and appeared in the vicinity of the starting post at the cove off Clarendon. The course lay from this point to the entrance of the harbor, nearly in line with the quarters of the Paris crew, and back to the place of starting—about 11 miles. The race was got off about 11 o'clock in fine style, Brayley, who had the choice of positions, slightly leading. As the boats swept up the river, Belyea, who pulled in a scull of Ross' build, pushed his antagonist hardily and at Appleby's wharf was leading about a boat's length. Belyea, who was working well and doing apparently very well, was making a fine swinging stroke and Brayley pulling shorter and quicker than Belyea, and with the energy of a man in real earnest. As the two boats glided up the course, keeping a wide distance apart, Brayley gained slightly and reached his turning stake at about the same time his rival did the other one. On the home stretch both worked with a will and kept well together. Belyea slightly leading until Appleby's wharf was passed, when both boats were almost in line. At this point Belyea slightly lagged in his stroke but receiving a vigorous cheer from his backers, spurred with great force, sending his boat a clear length ahead in very little time. At this juncture his rival pulled a trifle unsteadily and Belyea, encouraged by the gain which his desperate vigor had secured for him, plied the oars with great vigor, increasing his lead very slowly but still surely, till he reached the goal about five lengths ahead of his opponent. The time made as given by the judges was 24 min. and 24 min. 32 1/2 sec. As Brayley dropped a couple of strokes before coming to the stake boat, this time might fairly be considered 24 min. 32 sec. The race was really a good one and no question of unfairness on either side was raised, although Belyea complained that his turning boat appeared a couple of boats' length further off than it should have been. It was the first time that most have been clearly an accident, as Belyea's brother affixed the flags to the stakes and it could only have been caused by the heat, setting against it while engaged in this task. The stakes—240—were of course handed over to Belyea and also several personal bets were made, and Belyea was the winner in the contest. Brayley, who pulled in a small boat by Poket, clearly proved himself in this his first contest, an excellent oarsman, and need not be ashamed of his work or his defeat."
