Fish is also cheaper, haddock, dore and perch having dropped two cents per pound, while halibut is six cents cheaper than it was two weeks ago.

HE DID NOT MURDER BABE

Prisoner Mob Sought to Lynch at Thorold, Ont., Denies All Knowledge of Crime.

VICTIM'S FATHER TELLS HIS STORY

Pleaded for Mercy in Name of Man Who Did Not Get a Fair Trial.

Neal, laborer, aged 29 years, was placed on trial at the assizes here this morning, before Justice Kelly, charged with the murder of four-year-old Mar-garet Boucock, who disappeared from garet Boucock, who disappeared from her home at Thorold on July 13, and whose badly decomposed body, with its head severed, was found covered with brush near the new Welland ship canal excavations at Thorold on Aug. 4. Public indignation over the outrage remains at a fever point. McNeal

A feature of the trial was the ques-coning of the murdered girl's father,

Lioning of the murdered girl's father, Rouben Boucock, by the prisoner's counsel, as to whether the father knew betore the body of his child was found where it was hidden, and his emphatic denial of any previous knowledge. The child disappeared on July 13, and her dead body was found three weeks later hidden in brushwood near the new Welland ship canal excavation at Thorold.

Reuben Boucock, in the witness box obday, admitted that McNeal had been an unwelcome visitor to his house. He said he objected to McNeal because the latter was given to casting slurs at women is his conversation and be asting about conquests he had made among women while in France. The witness asserted that McNeal never was in France, though he had claumed to be a returned soldier.

Pleaded For Life.

With the mose ready he poured forth for nearly an hour one of the most remarkable defence ever made in any court, concluding with the dramatic statement: "I do not plead for justice—I shall get that at my trial. I ask for mercy; I did not kill the child; I would have been a brute to have done so; I pelad in the name of that Man Who was crucified without a fair trial."

When his speech was over, the crowd was satisfied and gave him back to the authorities.
