Harvard-Yile Expects Keer Competion from Oxford and Cabridge Stars.

cambridge Mass., July 15.—The coming interactions track meet between Harvid and Yale on the one side and (mbridge and Oxford on the other was promise of being extremely clee, and if an American visiory is ie result it will probably be by the immest margin. The Britons are buging a team of runners that can et up distance from the 440 onward, and strong contender in the hammer thow. The Americans look best in the print and remaining field events, an it looks like a toss-up in the high-hurdles, the outcome of which madecide the meet.

This is he second visit of Oxford and Cambridge to this country for a combined meet with Harvard and Yale. Thicams have met four times in all. Ech side has two victories, the Britis in 1899 and again in 1911, on their vin soil, and their opponents in 1901 a Berkeley Oval, New York, and in 18 in England. The victorious British icores have been razor erged, 50,4, while the wider margin of 6 to has been accumulated when the Amecans triumphed.

Krogness of Harvard, who finished second to Earl Thomson at the National A. A. U. meet as well as in the Intercollegiates, topped the high barriers 1-5 of a second faster when he won the event in the dual meet with Princeton. Partridge of Cambridge and either Hulman or Shedden of Yale are the other entries.

Nokes of Oxford seems to be the only Briton who has a chance in the held events. He threw the hammer 155 feet 11 inches in the British champlonships, far better than Fiske Brown of Harvard or Cruikshank of Yale, his opponents-to-be, have ever done. Nokes has also made a toss 160 feet 5 inches in competition. Brown's best so far was the 149 feet 1 inch he made in the Intercollegiates.
