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LONDON'S POVERTY-STRICKEN MEN AND WOMEN BATTLE WITH POLICE AT TRAFALGAR SQUARE

Thousands from East End of London Started to Parade Their Rage and Hunger Before the Upper Classes But Were Checked by Police—Fights Follow.

London, Oct. 13.—For the second time within a fortnight ten thousand poverty-stricken men and women have swept in from the east end to parade their rage and hunger before London's upper classes, and for the second time stern military efficiency of the metropolitan police have prevented a demonstration which might have ended in horror. Jobless thousands are back again in the slums with little to eat and little to do. They have accomplished what they set out to do. They succeeded in breaking a few policemen's heads. They looted, or attempted to loot a few cheap restaurants. They hurled a few bricks and clubs at their hereditary enemies, and then scattered and took up their weary march back to the slums from which they came.

HOOVER CONVINCED RAILROAD RATES AND WAGES TOO HIGH

Delegates to Unemployment Conference Will be Asked to Urge a Reduction in Both.

Bombay, Oct. 12.—The working committee of the National Congress and the cabinet of workers today adopted a resolution advocating a sympathetic strike throughout India on the day the Prince of Wales arrives in Bombay. The resolution urges provincial committees to arrange a boycott in the various cities which the Prince visits. The committee expressed the opinion that the national congress should inform neighboring and other States that the Government of India, "whose policy traditionally is guided by considerations looking more to holding India under subjection than to protecting her borders," in no way represented Indian opinion, and that India, as a self-governing state, did not intend to establish "undesirable" trade relations.

CHINA THINKS JAPAN LACKING IN SINCERITY

Declares Proposals Are Incompatible With Treaties With Foreign Powers.

Bangor, Me., Oct. 13.—"America should not countenance Japan's position of dominating China any more than she should countenance Germany's designs in the world war," said a speaker at a meeting of the Twenty-fifth Century club in the Bangor House Monday night following a banquet of the club held since last April. Forty-four members and guests were in attendance and a number of new members were voted in and new applications received, showing that the club is fast expanding.

New Members. New members of the club, which has the purpose of discussing present day world problems for the entertainment and education of its members, were voted in as follows: Lewis J. Dr. Sweetser made a pleasing appearance as he addressed the club members. He spoke each word with careful distinction and never hurried in his talk. Each point was taken up with a wealth of detail and quotations from treaties and walk-down authorities were frequently given. He took the decided stand that Japan can never take a rightful place as a world nation as long as she continues her oppression of China. His history of the situation in China and Japan and his summary of the present day conditions were especially well presented.

Proceeding the talk a letter of resignation from the club was read from Dr. Robert J. May, formerly president of the U. of M., and was accepted. He was then made an honorary member.

Japan is Grasping.

Japan has very few natural resources and is therefore grasping after those in China. This is a misshapen version of the whole trouble in that region, declared the lecturer. She must cease her unrighteous oppression of China, was the belief of Dr. Sweetser. Not only is Japan trying to gain control of China but she is also trying to control the whole of Asia, he said.

Japan Wants Social Equality.

Japanese are sensitive apparently, and demand racial equality, in the opinion of the speaker this can never be reached between the Americans and the Japanese. Inter-marriages of Oriental and American blood is a mistake and in the vast majority of cases proves to be a complete and much regretted failure.

Gentleman's Agreement a Failure.

The much talked of Gentleman's Agreement is a failure, was a statement made by Dr. Sweetser who explained the agreement and said that the great fault was that the agreement allowed Japan to decide just who was to be excluded. Japan made an agreement to refuse passports to laborers who wished to leave Japan for the United States.

Japan May Join With Hindoos.

There is no love lost between the Hindoos and the white race and the average Hindoo hates the English bitterly, according to the discussion. Some day, this newspaper man said, the Japanese will draw on the Hindoos for forces for a possible war.

Millions for Propaganda.

In this discussion it was brought out, as a strongly believed assertion, that Japan is spending more than \$1,000,000 each year in America to foster a friendly spirit toward Japan. Articles in newspapers, such as quotations from Japanese statesmen and lectures by prominent Japanese students of culture are some of the forms of propaganda, it was asserted.
