OVER WATER SUPPLY IMPROVED BY FILTRATION

Andover, N. B., June 2.—The annual meeting of the Andover water corporation was held last evening, a large attendance the ratepayers being present. The accounts for the last year were submitted and a vote of \$850 was ordered assessed on the property owners. Mr. McLaughlin was elected commissioner and S. P. Waite, auditor. The analysis of the water lately made showed that the new system of filtering water was a success and the commission was ordered to have the system further improved. They were also directed to have a monthly analysis of the water during the present year. The thanks of the corporation were extended to A. Knapley and Wm. Hays for the assistance they rendered the commissioners in trying out the system of filtration recommended by Dr. Bryce, of the department of agriculture, Ottawa, and Dr. Fisher, of the provincial board of health, Fredericton.

The ratepayers were unanimous in the opinion that neither money or effort should be spared to have a perfectly pure water supply for the village.

THE CASE OF REV. MR. DEIN-STADT. To the Editor of The Telegraph: Sir: There appeared in The Daily Telegraph of the 19th ult., an article purporting to be a report of the proceedings of a Board of Appeal of the Methodist Church in the case of the Rev. T. J. Deinstadt against the decision of the interim stationing committee of the New Brunswick and Prince Edward Islands, which reflects not only upon that committee but also upon the Court of Appeal.

Your reporter was evidently unacquainted with the facts of the case and has arrived at conclusions that are far from correct. A comparison of the judgment rendered and the statements in that article will at once show how incorrect those statements are. The full report of the action of the court is as follows:

COURT OF APPEAL. "The court met in the board room, Toronto, on Thursday, 19th inst., at 4 p. m. Present: Rev. Dr. Carman, general superintendent; Rev. Dr. Ross, Langford, Shorey, Rev. S. Sand, Rev. J. G. Deane, the Messrs. Messrs. Rowell, K. C. Inch, L. L. D., and A. W. Briggs.

"The following case was submitted for argument: A minister of the N. B. and P. E. I. Conference was appointed to a certain circuit by the stationing committee, submitted to the court, the interim stationing committee changed this appointment. The appellant contended that the decision was indefensible and that the grounds of the action of the interim stationing committee were insufficient.

"Judgment—Appeal dismissed on the ground that the committee did not exceed its powers as laid down by discipline. "WILLIAM I. SHAW, Secretary."

Your reporter says: "The judgment of the Appeals Court, delivered by Rev. Dr. Carman, general superintendent of the Canadian Methodist Church, contained the statement that this case, the first in which the circumstances had been such that an appeal from the decision of an interim committee had been made on the basis of the greatest management to the court, who had never realized before the absolute power entrusted to these committees. No case at all similar had ever before contained such elements of irregularity as to convince the court that its consideration was necessary."

"The court announced that the decision was made upon a technicality, as its substance was the under existing church law, unjust as the court considered that law to be, no appeal lay from the dictum of the interim committee. If the facts could be reviewed on appeal it was said, the judgment might have been different, but the court held that it had no power to review and that it must adhere directly to the letter of the law."

The appeal case was against the action of the interim committee on the ground that it had exceeded its jurisdiction. "The wisdom of the action of the committee was not under consideration and the court refused to hear arguments either for or against that point, and consequently it was not in a position to express 'the greatest amazement' and to make the statement ascribed to it.

To say that it never before realized the power entrusted to these committees is to ascribe to it an ignorance which impeaches its intelligence. The power referred to is frequently exercised. The former president of our conference, the Rev. S. Howard, only one year before the action of the committee complained against did, doing a rushing business. Some 30 men are employed. 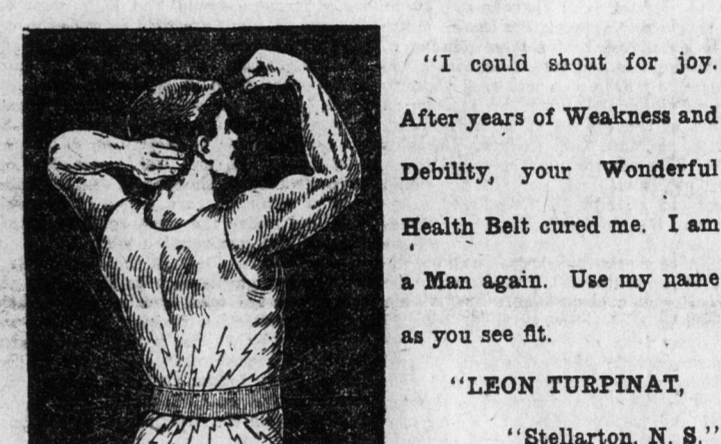
