WESTERN CANADA LEAGUE TO PLAY BALL IN EDMONTON

Winnipeg and Saskatoon Will Play Series of Six Games at Diamond Park

DOUBLE HEADERS WILL BE SATURDAY AND TUESDAY

Series Transferred from Winnipeg to Edmonton on Account of Strike

Charlie Moll, owner of the Winnipeg baseball club, was in the city Tuesday, arranging with the local sport authorities to play a series of six games between Winnipeg and Saskatoon at Diamond Park. These games are the regular scheduled games of the Western Canada league which are transferred from Winnipeg to Edmonton on account of the strike, and as they are the two leading teams in the league, the games should be classy performances.

The games will be played on Friday, Saturday and Monday, June 27, 28 and 30, and Tuesday, July 1. The double headers will be played on Saturday and Tuesday.

Mr. Moll is particularly anxious to win this series as it has an important bearing on the season, the nature of which he refuses to divulge. He hints at important developments in the Western Canada League. One of the reasons Mr. Moll has for playing the games in Edmonton is that he figures he will have a better chance than he would in Saskatoon where the bleachers would be distinctly unfriendly. In Edmonton the fans would at least be neutral. These games should have been played at Winnipeg and Mr. Moll is unwilling to have them played at Saskatoon.

Wednesday and Saturday Evenings Interfered With Holiday Gatherings


