REV. FATHER FEENY

PASTOR ST. AUGUSTINE'S CHURCH, DUNDAS

On Tuesday, the 29th ult., the feast of Sts. Peter and Paul, Rev. Father J. J. Feeny celebrated his fortieth anniversary of his ordination in the Holy Priesthood. Two score of years is a good long span in the life of the average priest, and in a brief review of the history of our own diccess of Hamilton the reader will be rather surprised to learn how few priests ever attain their twenty-fifth anniversary.

It was on June 29th, 1880, Rev. Father Feeny was ordained by the late Right, Rev. Bishop Crinnon, at St. Mary's Cathedral, Hamilton. His first appointment as a young priest was as Curate in Mount Forest where he remained for some months when his health failed and he was sent to Dandas House of Providence for treatment. In March, 1881, after having recuhe was appointed Curate to the late Very Rev. Dean O'Riley, where he was stationed for about five years; being superintendent of the Separate Schools be made many improvements both in the Church and school buildings.

After Dean O'Riley's death Father Feeny was transferred to Arthur parish, and later to Priceville parish in county Grey) which embraced Melanothon, 25 miles away, Glenelg, eight miles, Osprey Tewnship, 16 miles and Dundalk, eighteen miles. His next appointment was as Curate to Brantford where he was stationed for eight years; then to Acton, as parish priest, which included Austic Mission, 16 miles from Acton and Georgetown, nine miles away. Here he remained for ten years and a half, when he was appointed parish priest of Oakville with missions at Burling. ton, Trafalgar and Milton, to be served. After a year in this appoint. ment His Lordship Bishop Dowling appointed him Pastor of St Augus. tine's parish, Dundas, succeeding the late Mons. E. I. Heenan, where he has presided for ten years.

Space will hardly permit our effort to but briefly review the many extraordinary improvements made in this parish, and carried out to the letter, under the able adminstration of Father Feeny. Commencing as a young Curate here, the extension to the main altar, the two side altars, the heating system and the pews were all installed and completed under his direction. And on his return to this parish, after a lapse of nearly thirty years, though a much older man, he immediately set about the decorating of the interior of the church, which is admitted to be one of the mest artistic and well appointed parish churches in the diocese and speaks volumes for the many a long day at the widespread good taste and untiring efforts of spirit of secularization in education Father Feeny.

As the proportions of the new temple appeared above the ground all Prince Albertans congratulated themselves to find that at last they had a man who had confidence in the future of their city. The erec-tion of a substantial brick residence 45x35 feet followed in 1894, and Mgr. Pascal, a great lover of flowers, embellished the city with a fine garden. 
