

REV. FATHER FEENEY

PASTOR ST. AUGUSTINE'S CHURCH, DUNDAS

On Tuesday, the 29th ult., the feast of St. Peter and Paul, Rev. Father J. J. Feeny celebrated his fortieth anniversary of his ordination in the Holy Priesthood.

It was on June 29th, 1880, Rev. Father Feeny was ordained by the late Right Rev. Bishop Cullen, at St. Mary's Cathedral, Hamilton.

After Dean O'Riley's death Father Feeny was transferred to Arthur parish, and later to Priceville parish (in county Grey) which embraced Melancthon, 25 miles away, Glenelg, eight miles, Osprey Township, 16 miles and Dundalk, eighteen miles.

His next appointment was as Curate to Brantford where he was stationed for eight years; then to Acker, as parish priest, which included Assiniboia Mission, 16 miles from Acker and Georgetown, nine miles away.

Space will hardly permit our effort to but briefly review the many extraordinary improvements made in this parish, and carried out to the letter, under the able administration of Father Feeny.

Though not as alert, as remembered by some in past years, time has treated him kindly; he is still quite vigorous and able to administer to the faithful, particularly solicitous after the welfare of his parishioners both in health and sickness.

Father Feeny is receiving congratulations from his friends both in town and from the surrounding parishes.

BISHOP OF PRINCE ALBERT

PASSES AWAY IN FRANCE

Mgr. A. Pascal who died in France last week, was born at St. Genes de Beauvais, in the department of Ardèche, France, August 3, 1845, and studied at Viviers and Aubenas.

"Several among them faithfully recite twice the beads every Sunday, as well as on Fridays and days of fast and abstinence. When away from the priest and buried in the solitude of the woods, they gather up all their religious pictures, with which they decorate a tepal, which for the time being is transformed into a chapel. There they assemble to pray and sing hymns in their language."

In 1890 he went to Europe to recuperate and also to solicit aid for the mission.

Meanwhile it had been decided to divide the diocese of St. Albert and to create the vicariate of Saskatchewan. The superior general of the Oblates, Rev. Fabre, selected Father Pascal for the new dignity, and on the 19th of April, 1891, he was made bishop of Moseopolis and vicar-apostolic of Saskatchewan.

Prince Albert, which his wisdom designated as the seat of the new diocese, was nearly wholly Protestant. In 1882 Father Andre had bought an old log hut with its adjoining sheds on river lot 75, which became the seat of the first mission. This was visited from St. Laurent by Fathers Vegreville and Moulin until 1885 when Father Andre took up his permanent residence in Prince Albert.

Such was the situation when Mgr. Pascal came to take possession. He immediately took steps to erect a cathedral on a more suitable location than that of the old mission. As the proportions of the new temple appeared above the ground all Prince Albertians congratulated themselves to find that at last they had a man who had confidence in the future of their city.

ARCHBISHOP DEPLORES WORLDLINESS
His Grace the Archbishop of New York, in his eloquent address before the Catholic Educational Association, explored the rampant worldliness of the day, saying: "The Church has grieved for many a long day at the widespread spirit of secularization in education and is gravely anxious at the present advocacy of Federal centralization and the still more dangerous tendency toward socialization in education."

A Catholic laity, well trained, zealous and unafraid can work wonders in a country so well disposed as ours to noble impulses and to the pursuit of the right as God gives them to see the right. That Catholic leaders may increase and multiply and fill the land with their righteous force and noble example is an intention worthy of our prayers during the coming month of August.—The Pilot.

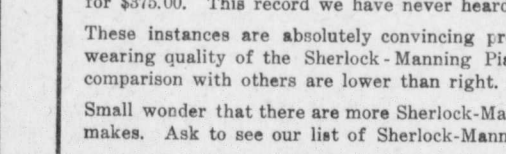
