LENINE ORDERS ARREST OF KING

Wants Roumanian Monarch Placed in the Fortress at Petrograd

TROOPS INSTRUCTED Petrograd, Jan. 18.—Premier Lenine yesterday signed an order for the arrest of King Ferdinand of Roumania, who is to be sent to Petrograd for imprisonment in the fortress of St. Peter and St. Paul. The order for the King's arrest describes in detail the way in which he is to be carried out and in which the King is to be treated. The Bolshevik leaders believe they have sufficient forces on the Roumanian front to carry it out. The order which is signed by Premier Lenine, calls upon Russian soldiers and officials on the Roumanian front to arrest the King and deliver him in Petrograd on board a special train, for imprisonment. It constitutes the latest development in connection with the alleged starving of Bolshevik troops by Roumanian forces, which led to the arrest of Roumanian Minister Diamandi, and the sending of an ultimatum to Roumania demanding the punishment of the officials responsible. The order for the arrest of the King describes in detail the way in which he is to be handled and guarded on the way to Petrograd. The attitude of the Bolsheviks in this respect appears to be serious, as they believe they have sufficient forces on the Roumanian front to carry out their threat. No reply to the ultimatum has thus far been received from Roumania. The Bolsheviks take the position that the treatment of certain Russian troops on the Roumanian front warrants reprisals of any nature. The Diplomatic Corps met at the American Embassy at the call of its treatment while under arrest, and urged a vigorous protest. For several weeks there has been friction between Roumania and Russia. The trouble originated with the attempts to spread the propaganda of the Bolsheviks in Roumania. It was charged by the Roumanians that Russian troops were guilty of disorders. Recently Roumanian troops surrounded and disarmed a Russian regiment. The Bolsheviks retorted by arresting the Roumanian Minister in Petrograd, although he was released on the demand of the Diplomatic Corps. An ultimatum was despatched to Roumania threatening the severest measures if Russia's demands were not complied with within 24 hours.

WATCHWORD IS "CONSERVE FUEL"

Criminal to Burn a Pound More Than Necessary, Says Controller

By Courier Leased Wire Ottawa, Jan. 18.—C. A. McGrath, Canadian Fuel Controller, returned from Toronto this morning, commenting on Dr. Garfield's coal order in the United States. Mr. McGrath made the following remarks: "It is merely an indication of the fact that the United States is at war. When a country is at war, one never knows what will happen at any moment. That is a feature which I have always tried from time to time to keep before the Canadian people. It must be evident to everyone that the watchword should be 'conserve fuel.' It is criminal for domestic or industrial users of fuel to burn a pound more than is absolutely necessary. "So far as the present situation in Canada is concerned, our problems are not identical with those of the United States. It must be remembered that we are on the outside zone of the territory recently freed from Roumanian neighbors, and unfortunately for us, the zone nearest the north pole. We are not confronted with the problem of density of population which has resulted in the United States in congested railway traffic. It must be remembered that when the largest and most important country in the world undertakes to throw itself into this great world war and is marshaling all its forces, and its drastic steps will be taken, end, drastic machinery will be taken before us to get its maximum of efficiency. Canada gradually worked on to a footing a couple of years ago, and I believe it is generally felt that she has reached her present efficiency by the gradual process which, in a small country like this, can be done without any extraordinary measures being necessary. "I have been working in complete accord with the American fuel administration, and probably no one in this country is in a better position to know the tremendous difficulties which have confronted Dr. Garfield in his work. It is needless to say that the moment the situation arises in Canada requiring drastic action, the matter will be brought to the attention of the government."

LOYD GEORGE'S CLARION CALL FOR MORE MEN

No Democracy Can Survive Refusal of Its Adherents To Die For It

By Courier Leased Wire. London, Jan. 18.—Premier Lloyd George, addressing the Labor delegates to-day, said no man standing on the watch tower could deny the urgency of the need for raising more men. The Prime Minister said no democracy has ever long survived the failure of its adherents to be ready to die for it. Mr. Lloyd George said that he and President Wilson without previous consultation there was no opportunity had laid down substantially the same program of demands for the termination of the war. There was no man willing to make peace without complete restoration of Belgium and reparation, the Premier said. From Germany had been but one answer, he added, "and it came from von Tirpitz's soul—never!" Continuing, the Premier said: "Our channel ports are not far from the fighting line and unless we are prepared to stand up to the people who are dominating Germany, British democracy, French democracy and the democracy of Europe will be at the mercy of the most cruel military autocracy the world has ever seen." Mr. Lloyd George said that his and President Wilson's war aims had been acclaimed throughout the Entente countries. There had been hardly a voice of criticism, save from a few who wished he had made more extreme demands. The Socialists of France, Italy and Great Britain, he said, had accepted them as very fair general demands.

Continued from page one have to go to their tasks afoot and with empty stomachs, and return on foot in the evening. Electric light is uncertain and sometimes whole districts are in darkness, the central power station having stopped for lack of fuel. The supply of paraffin, which is used for cooking and lighting, has stopped temporarily because the cisterns are snowbound. The Daily bread ration is 5 1/4 ounces, which is said to be insufficient, and potatoes are selling at one ruble a pound. The manager of the Persian Discount Loan Bank and several high officials of the finance ministry and the Treasury department, according to Reuters despatch, have been arrested, charged with aiding the strikers in the government departments. General Korniloff, leader of one of the opposition factions, is reported to have been wounded in a fight between his forces and Bolsheviks at Chrowsky, commissary for foreign trade, says that a decree regulating foreign trade will be issued shortly. It will provide that trade will be allowed only with countries, where committees are appointed to insure that imports from Russia will not pass through the hands of middlemen and which will guarantee that goods thus imported will not be subjected to speculation or re-exportation.
