Editorial Jottings.

The referendum on the prohibition question in Ontario will be taken on Monday, October 20.

Monday, October 13, has been fixed by the Government as Thanksgiving Day for the Dominion.

The Prince of Wales was born at White Lodge, Sheen, on June 23, 1894. He is therefore 25 years and 2 months.

One of the oldest documents known to man, a cuneiform fragment from the lowest stratum of Babylon, begins with the words: 'Alas! Alas! times are not what they were.'

Queen Mary has one more name than her son, the Prince of Wales. He has seven given names while she has eight—Victoria Mary Augusta Louise Olga Pauline Claudine Agnes.

European capitalism in the United States has made enquiries at Sydney concerning the possibility for regular shipments of Cape Breton coal to Norway and other parts of Europe.

The Earl of Athlone, brother of Queen Mary, will be appointed Governor General of Canada next summer in succession to the Duke of Devonshire, the present incumbent, according to the National News.

In Germany large families are encouraged. In Canada some landlords are allowed to discriminate against families with children. The Great War Veterans of Windsor, Ont., have declared war on this type of landlord.

Marshal Foch has recently asked the Belgian Government to have a search made for the body of his son, who was killed in August, 1914, in the Belgian Ardennes. Marshal Foch has religiously refrained from mentioning his lost son and few knew that the younger Foch was killed early in the war.

The Atlantic Biographical Station at St. Andrew's, N. B. is conducting experiments to determine the movement of the water in the Bay of Fundy. Bottles, each containing a post card, have been set afloat in the Bay at various points and a reward is offered for the return of each card with information as to its discovery.

1919 Victory Loan in Kings County

Plans are being made for the flotation of the 1919 Victory Loan. The amount asked for in Nova Scotia this year is \$17,145,000, and the allotment for Kings county is \$350,000. Considering that this county last year raised \$838,500, it ought not to be difficult to raise the amount asked this year. Mr. George E. Graham, of Kentville, is the county chairman appointed for this year, and Mr. H. P. Davidson, of Wolfville, is the secretary. The county organizer is Mr. S. F. Thompson, of the Nova Scotia Trust Co. The county office this year will be in Kentville, but it is planned to have an office in Wolfville during the few weeks that the canvassing is being done. Mr. W. C. B. Harris has consented to again act as chairman of the Wolfville district.

Citizens' League

The meeting of the Citizens' League held in Temperance Hall last Friday evening was poorly attended, there being only about twenty-five present. Reports were given by the various committees.

Dr. Coit, on behalf of the Beautifying Committee, called attention to the School Fair which is to be held today and asked the co-operation of all present to make it a success.

Mr. Herbert Stairs, for the committee on Law Enforcement, made several suggestions re keeping children of the streets in the evenings, enforcement of law regarding school attendance, etc. After considerable discussion it was moved and carried that the Citizens' League back the School Board in enforcing the truant law and that the League ask the School Board to appoint Mr. Crowell as truant officer.

Dr. DeWolfe reported for the committee on Civic Education that plans were being formulated to have the Chautauqua in College Hall the latter part of October.

Dr. Roach was appointed the League's representative on the committee to see about erecting a memorial tablet for Wolfville's fallen heroes.

The matter of changing the time came up for discussion. Dr. DeWolfe announced that the Seminary and Academy were going back to the old time on Monday. Mayor Hales was asked what the council was going to do in the matter. He said that the council had decided to change the time on Oct. 1st. It was thought that the town should have the same time as the Institutions. It was therefore moved and passed that the League ask the town council to change the time of the town back to old time on Monday.

G W V A

A Wolfville Branch of the Great War Veterans Association of Canada was formed at a meeting of returned men held in the Town Hall on Friday evening last. The aims of this Association shall be to perpetuate the close and kindly ties of Mutual Service in the Great War, to preserve the memory and records of those who suffered and died for the nation, to ensure that proper provision is made for the care of the sick, wounded and needy among those who served in the Overseas Forces and to open a Club Room in the town where the overseas men may spend their evenings in a profitable manner with reading, writing and games, etc. With these objects before them it is hardly necessary to state that the Veterans will without doubt receive the whole-hearted support of the town in general.

At the meeting on Friday evening some forty or fifty men were present and the following officers and committee were elected:

Pres.—Eugene Stackhouse, M. M.; Secy.—Treas.—P. W. Davidson (two wooden legs do not necessarily indicate a slow team); Executive Committee—Geo. Nowlin and Geo. Dexter, Wolfville; B. Palmer, Grand Pre; and Jas. Amburg, Gaspereau. At present there have been some forty members signed on and it is important that all men hand in their names for membership as soon as possible. The Association expects to open a Club Room within the next few days over THE ACADIAN Building (formerly Graham Building) and the success of the enterprise depends upon the finances obtained, which are at present derived mostly from membership dues. Any man wishing to become a member should fill in an application for membership either at the office of the Secretary or A. P. Robart's store. Any man belonging to another branch, and desirous of transferring to the home branch should hand in his name to the Secretary who will make the required application for transfer.

To-day (Friday) the Give Service Girls have kindly offered to co-operate with the Veterans in carrying out a Tag Day. In this manner it is hoped to raise sufficient funds to give a good start to the Club Room furnishings. When you are tagged during the day stop and realize, first, that you are giving towards a Club Room for the older boys and young men of the town in order that they may have some place to spend their evenings besides "the street corners, and secondly, that you are helping to give a Club Room to the boys who a few months past were helping to give a Country to you. This is to be a Tag Day but it does not necessarily follow that you are only to give a few cents. You are requested to give nothing less than ten cents and are expected to give as much as you consider the movement is worth to you and your town. No subscriptions will be too large.
