II. And be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid, that the Justices of the said Court of King's Bench for Civil Causes shall, during this Act, have power and authority, and they are hereby empowered and authorized, in all cases heard and tried before them in term, to give and pronounce Judgement upon the same at any time during the ten days next succeeding the term in which such cases shall have been so heard and tried, and to cause such Judgements to be entered or inscribed upon the Records of the Court, as if the same had been given and pronounced on the last day of the term, and all such Judgements so pronounced and entered or inscribed, shall to allintents andpurposes have the same force and effect in Law as if the same had been pronounced in term, any Law, usage or statute to the contrary in any wise notwithstanding.
III. And be it further enacted by the AuthoJustices may fix ty aforesaid, that the Justices of the said

Court of Kings Bench for Civil Causes in the said District of Montreal may during this Act as often as they shall so deem it necessary, order and fix the trial of any cause in which, at the option and choice of either party, a trial and Verdict of a Jury may be granted to take place at some day certain in the ensuing vacation, under the direction of any one of the Justices of the said Court, and on which day the writ for summoning the Jurors shall be made returnable, and the trial and Verdict which shall then take place, being recorded and returned on the first day of the ensuing term of the said Court of King's Bench for Civil Causes, for such ulterior proceedings thereupon as Law and Justice may require, shall have the same force and effect, to all legal intents and purposes, as if such trial had taken place and the verdict been given in term.
