The Dalhousie Field, which the University renovated at a cost of \$20,000 during the last two years, will be the scene of only two Canadian football games this season.

The Dalhousie Canadian football team will play a total of three home games this year under the regular schedule of the Halifax Canadian Football League.

It is planned that the two games that are played on our field will both be subsidized; one by the Students' Council, and the other by the University. In each case half the admission price will be Officers for '50 paid and the students will only have to part with 25c per game.

Last summer, when the schedule of games to be played by the League was drawn up, Dalhousie of Pine Hill was chosen secretary. University authorities were uncerain whether the field would be in playing condition by fall, and the field was overlooked when the League considered the matter.

In fact, Dalhousie had no representative at this meeting.


It was agreed at this meeting that all games would be played at the Wanderers' Grounds.

When the League met this week to consider the matter further Wanderers' produced this agreement and insisted that it be kept.

The League refused to allow Dalhousie students in to Dal games at half price, even after Dalhousie offered to allow spectators for the opposing team in at the same rate. Dal even suggested that all spectators be allowed in free. This idea was squelched by other members of the League.

The League would not allow Dalhousie to play any games on its own field until they were guaranteed the full admission cost would be met. The factor which finally persuaded them to do so was the unwillingness of some of the teams to play mid-week games.

The cause of this essential difference of opinion was that Dalhousie participants were in the game for the spirit of the thing, while the other teams seem more tempt to introduce a new game to wreck the League and dampen the tied to canes.
