Barons teach Rams a lesson in York basketball tourney

Following Woodlands Rams' 81-41 loss to the Oakwood Collegiate Barons in the York University High School Invitational Basketball Tournament Wednesday, both coaches said, "We are anxious to play them again."
Both found plenty of bright spots to pick from the game. Normally, a 40 point drubbing is something you would rather just forget.
The luck of the draw matched the current PSSAA Southwestern division leaders against the team that is one of the best, if not the best, team in Ontario. Woodlands won the opening game of the tour-

Reid was once again high scorer with 24 points while Spagnuolo added 15. Ed Galka and Dave Bradshaw, who played a very strong game, counted eight apiece.
Erindale resumes its exhibition schedule this week against the powerful nationally ranked McMaster Marauders. The Warriors play in Hamilton Saturday night.

Humber Colleges. His teams at Humber won the Ontario championships in 1972, '73, '75 and '76. He also coaches young tennis players like Glenn Michibata, Lisa Senn, Bill Rennie and Cathy Morton.
Thornbury also taught business administration at Humber College for eight years.
One of his goals at ORC will be to increase membership to 450 families. In its first year of existence, the club has a membership of 350 families.
"I'm concerned with the development programs," Thornbury said, "but I'm also interested in the social side of tennis. I think we can develop the social level more."

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
