KING ATTACKED

Scored by High Church Organ for Worshipping With Presbyterians.

London, Oct. 17.—The Church Times, organ of the Ritualists, contains a virulent attack on King Edward for attending the services at the Crathie Presbyterian Parish Church. The King declares this newspaper, is a "Catholic Prince," and as such ought not to be found worshipping in the company of Presbyterians, and conforming to a "different religion," in Scotland.

Queen Victoria, continues the Church Times, attended the Crathie Church because of her "Jacobite sympathies," and the King "ought to know better than to follow her example."

The Church Times seems to forget that King Edward is not only spiritual and temporal head of the Anglican Church, but of the Presbyterian Church of Scotland, as well. Just as he must attend the services of the Church of England when in England, so his duty compels him to attend the services of the Church of Scotland when in North Britain.

The Presbyterian Church is the official State Church of Scotland, precisely as the Anglican is the State Church of England, and King Edward occupies the analogous position of head of both.

Ameer Habib Ullah has increased the pay of the Afghan soldiers, and promised a reduction of the taxes on land.

The French Government has discovered 3,000 guns and revolvers, with ammunition, at Montcau-des-Mines, a hotbed of Socialist agitation.

The memorial fountain erected at Niagara Falls in honor of Queen Victoria will be unveiled by Adam Brown, of Hamilton, to-morrow.
