## RESCUED FROM FATHER THAMES

Thos. Hughes has a Narrow Escape from Drowning on Saturday Night.

Louis Braxton Plunged in and Brought Him Ashore-Has a Fine Record for Life-Saving.

Tom Hughes, of this city, had very narrow escape from drowning Saturday evening about a quarter to seven. He was walking on the Rankin dock when he, in some way, fell into the river. As he struck the wat er he gave one cry for help.

Howard Besant and Louis Braxton were in Hendershott's livery at the time and both hearing the cry ran down to the dock, but it was so dark that they could see nothing. They struck a match and could see a man's hat floating on the water. They then saw a man's hands and head come up to the surface and strike a pile about ten feet from the dock. Both shouted to the man to hold on, and young Besant secured a rope and threw it out

Hughes could not hold it, however, and was evidently weakening, when one hand he held the drowning man and with the other he clung to the rope. Besant tried to pull them both ashore but found he could not. He then secured the assistance of W. Williams and two othermen to help him, and the two men were soon landed on

the dock. Hughes by this time had lost all consciousness and it was some time before he regained his senses. He was taken to the livery stable and about nine o'clock was taken home.

This is the fifth time in five years that Braxton has prevented a drown-ing accident and his bravery should be suitably recognized by a medal from the Humane Society. He has saved two boys named Du-

mas and Bellair, a man named Turcotte and another man and Hughes. Hughes was able to resume work his morning.
