MARKET REVIEW AND FORECAST

TORONTO, Mar. 28.—The live stock market has been furnishing the interest to market reports during the coming forward, prices are gradually creeping upward, and new high level records are being reached. \$30.50 fed off cars in Toronto last week, and have prospects of going higher. A new high level record was also set when a shipment of 16 lambs sold last week at the Montreal Yards at \$17.00. High prices are being obtained for those steers are offering, choice heaves being let around \$12.50 to \$12.75, with a few bay heaves for the Easter market going as high as \$15. Some milkers are bringing high prices, selling at farm sales from \$75 to \$140.

The marketing of farm produce continues to be slow, mainly because there is not much surplus available to market. Last week the oil market slumped slightly in Winnipeg and Chicago, and this was reflected to some extent in Toronto government buying, however, has strengthened the Winnipeg market, and the demand remains firm. Oats are selling at from 30 cts. to 41.15 through the country districts, and bring about 33 cts. in Toronto, oatmeal lots.

Wheat.
Practically the only wheat moving through market channels at present is Western grain. Oats are selling 48 to 50 cents daily are being shipped to keep Ontario millers at work. With the price of other feeds ranging much higher than wheat as compared with their food value, there is no disposition to market. Success in road wheat to market. One instance has appeared in the daily price of an Ontario wheat at which Ontario wheat is being quoted at \$1.00, while frozen wheat brought in from the States is being offered for sale at \$1.10. Apparently the only thing that will bring Ontario wheat up to the market will be the fixing of a higher price. This has already been done in the United States. Toronto quotations are: Manitoba Wheat—In store, Fort William, nominal (including 1½c) 90c; in store, southern, \$1.23 1/2; No. 3 northern, \$1.26 1/2; No. 3 northern, \$1.27 1/2; No. 1 wheat, \$1.21 1/2; Ontario Wheat—In store, No. 2, \$1.23; in store, Montreal.

Cowes Grain.
Live stock feeders have their own troubles this year in locating feeds. They have been squeezed up for some months in the hope of the American crop. Apparently the transportation situation in the United States is still very serious, as they are not allowing any considerable quantities to be shipped to Canada. From time to time a few carloads of American corn find their way into Canada at around 10c a bushel. But, the United supply, as well as the high price, had some effect on the transportation situation. The dealers are unable to import any on account of an order from the United States War, the price of corn ruled in the oat market for a few days last week, but the action of the Dominion Government in buying up supplies of this commodity for export has again strengthened prices, and the cost of Canadian Corn—St. S. A. War Board prohibitive importation. Manitoba—No. 2 C.W., 94c; extra No. 1 feed, 95c; No. 1 feed, 95c, in store, Fort William, Ontario Oats—No. 3 white, 94c to 95c, nominal; No. 3, 92c to 94c. Eye—No. 1, \$1.50. Heavy—Milling, new, \$1.75 to \$1.80, according to weight. Pows—No. 2, \$2.50 to \$2.60, according to weight. Buckwheat, \$1.25 to \$1.35.

Milk Feeds.
Dairy farmers who are in the market for milk feeds will be glad to note the Order-in-Council which has just been passed making it compulsory to include upon buyers of milk feeds accepting a certain proportion of flour along with their shipment. The vicious system of including up to 50 per cent. of the contents of the car of flour only milk feeds are ordered, has resulted in large stocks of flour being carried by farmers, to do so, but the farmers do not, while at the same time the Food Control Board has been urging the saving of wheat flour. The milk feed situation remains unchanged so far as supplies are concerned, and the price is not in cutting these supplies, the price not being effective. Toronto quotes car lots delivered Montreal, including bag including, ed. bran, 55c; shorts, 50c; high middlings, 45c to 46c; good feed flour per bushel, \$2.45. Montreal quotations: bran, 52c; shorts, 48c; middlings, 45c to 50c; meal, 45c to 46c.

Hay and Straw.
Considerable hay is being shipped out of Ontario, but large stocks still remain on hand, many districts having two years' supply on hand. Prices are according to quality and access to market. Hay is quoted on the Montreal market, No. 1, \$17 to \$18; mixed, \$14 to \$16, while Montreal quotes \$17 for \$2. Hay in car lots: straw selling at \$1.50 to \$1.60.

Seeds.
Wholesalers are taking the following prices for seed at country points: Alaska, No. 1 fancy, bush-11.25 to \$13.00; do, No. 1 ordinary, bush-11.75 to 12.50; do, No. 2, per bushel, \$11.50 to 11.50.

Potatoes and Beans.
Toronto Ontario potatoes 11.50 and Delaware 12 a bag. An earlier feeling is also reported in the potato market. Montreal, car lots, 11.75 to 12.00, while being sold at \$1.15 to \$1.75 per 90-lb. bag, car lots.

Prices of beans are rather irregular, Montreal paying from \$1.25 to \$1.50 according to quality, while in Toronto the jobbing way good beans are bringing as high as \$2. Toronto's Canadian beans are selling at \$1.35; foreign hand picked, \$1.75 to \$1.80.

Eggs and Poultry.
Local egg supplies are coming on to the market much more freely now, and will soon be able to satisfy domestic consumption. In the meantime, eggs are being brought in from United States at about 45 cts. delivered in Montreal and Toronto. The question that is engaging the attention of poultrymen now is, what price will storage men pay for eggs this year. Canadian buyers usually begin putting eggs on the price during the month of March, but this year supplies will not warrant that. Buyers are paying 20c to 25c in country points, 25c to 41c, while eggs are wholesaling to the retail trade in Toronto at 45c to 50c. In Montreal, the price of new laid, 47c to 50c and new laid, 45c to 47c.

Pew poultry are coming on to the market, and the demand is good at an advance of about two cents, based on the quotations: Live weight, dressed, 100 lbs. 25c to 26c

Dairy Produce.
The butter market is keeping up well owing to usual stocks and good demand. Toronto dealers are paying, at country points, for creamery butter, 45c to 46c; creamery, 45c to 46c; dairy butter, 34c to 35c; wholesale prices in Toronto for creamery butter, 45c to 46c; 51c to 52c, with fresh made bringing one cent higher, choice grades 51c to 52c, with ordinary dairy price, 35c to 40c.

During the week arrangements have been made with the United States Government whereby the export of oleomargarine from the United States has been lifted to the extent of 100,000 cases. This oleomargarine may be imported to Canada each month. This will not leave the market in any such a short measure as it has enjoyed for the last few weeks. It imports will have an effect upon Creamery butter.

Cattle moved live. During the past week with prices 25 to 40 cents higher on a few of last week's weight, or of almost one-third of the ruling price of 116 this week. The increase illustrates the scarcity of finished hogs in the country at this period, and shows the effect of the supply. The total hog receipts last week were 1,234, as compared to 1,956 this week last year.
