A Plea for Mr. Healy.

Rev. Father McNeece then addressed the convention. He said he was sorry he did not come prepared to make a speech. He intended simply to come there as a looker-on at their proceedings. But having read the resolutions for the first time that morning, and seeing that one of the first resolutions proposed to drive out of public life, the man whom they had returned at the head of the poll in North Louth. come there and propose an amendment to this resolution, amendment to this resolution, and in proposing the amendment he would endeavor to do so in as few words as possible. (Hear, hear.) The amendment was to omit the last three paragraphs of the resolution and to adopt instead the following:

past differences which have hitherto
existed amongst Irishmen, and appeals to the Chairman and members
of the Party to enforce unity and
discipline in the ranks of the Party
in the future; and we pledge our
support in any steps that they may
think necessary for the enforcement
of that discipline."

MR. DILLON stepped to the front of the platform, and a wave of enthusiasm swept over the vast assembly. Slowly, firmly, he asked, "To you or do you not desire a United Irish Party?" The reply was unmistakable. "We do," shouted his hearers with one accord.

On a show of hands, the motion was carried by an overwhelming majority.
