Tuesday, 17th February, 1795.

THE order of the day for the House to go into a Committee of the whole House upon the Bill, for the appointment of Inspectors to ascertain the quality of Staves and Timber for exportation, being read.

On motion of Mr. Young, feconded by Mr Lees, Ordered, that the order of the day be discharged.

And on motion of Mr. Young, feconded by Mr. Berthelot,

Ordered, that the Bill for the appointment of Inspectors to ascertain the quality of Staves and Timber for exportation, be committed to five Members, of whom three shall form a Quorum, with power to send for persons and papers, and to report with all convenient speed.

Ordered also, that Messieurs Young, Duniere, Richardson, Lester and

Jordan do compose the said Committee.

A petition from fundry Merchants and Inhabitants of the City and District of Montreal, whose names are thereunto subscribed; was prefented to the House, and read by Mr. Riebardson in his place.

On motion of Mr. Richardson, seconded Mr. Berthelot,

Ordered, that the faid petition be brought up.

And the same was delivered in at the table, and read in both languages by the Clerk—Setting Forth, that the superior Term, for the trial of Civil Causes in His Majfrit's Court of King's Bench for the District of Montreal, should by Law have commenced on Monday the second day of February instant; in consequence whereof upwards of sifty new Actions had been instituted for the said term.

That upwards of two hundred causes have been transmitted from His Majesty's late Court of Common Pleas for the said District, to

the faid Court of King's Bench.

That the faid Court hath not yet met according to Law, to the utter suspension of Justice and to the manifest injury of His Majesty's subjects, many of whom in the causes transmitted from the said Court of Common Pleas have attended, in consequence of Interlocutors, Rules or orders of said Court, with their witnesses from the United States of America, the Province of Upper Canada and other distant parts.

And therefore PRAYING THE House to enquire into the causes, why the course and administration of Justice have been impeded in the saids District, and to frame an Act to be passed into a Law, as well to prevent such evils in suture, as to indemnify the suitors for the delays they are put to, and the expences they have unavoidably incurred.
